Regular March Term of the County Board.

(Continued from last week)

In the matter of the vacation of the lots, blocks, streets and reserves of South Oregon City, No. 2, and a part of South Oregon City, No. 3, in Clackamas county, Oregon. This matter coming on regularly to be heard this day, the petitioner, T. L. Charman, trustee, being present in person, and it appearing to the satisfaction of the court that said petitioner is the owner in fee of the hereinafter described real property, that the vacation of said lots, blocks, streets and reserves of said described real property would not particularly affect any person except said petitioner, that said petitioner duly petitioned this court for the vacation of said lots, blocks, streets and reserves, which petition was filed with the county clerk of said Clackamas county on the first day of February, 1900, the same being more than 30 days previous to the sitting of this court; that notice of the pending of said petition was duly set up in three of the most public places of each of said towns on the 1st day of February, 1900, more than 30 days prior to the sitting of this court; that proof of the due and legal posting of said notices has been satisfactorily made to this court and is on file herein; that each of said notices contained a full and clear description of said real property to be vacated; that said petition duly set forth the particular circumstances of the case and gave a distinct description of the property to be vacated and which is hereinafter described, and duly gave the names of all persons to be affected by the vacation of said property, and it further appearing to the court that all matters pertaining to said vacation have been legally performed; that no objections to the granting of said petition have been filed in this court or made to the same; that such petition should be granted and said vacations should be made, and the court being fully advised in the premises. It is now therefore ordered and adjudged by this court, that all the lots, blocks and streets and reserves of said hereinafter described real property be and the same are hereby vacated and held for naught as prayed for in said petition; the said

property is described as follows to-wit: All of the town known as South Oregon City No. 2, as found on page 18, book 5, of records of town plats for said county and state to wit: Beginning at the point of beginning, which is the southeast corner of said tract, and running thence west 1070 feet, thence north, 512.5 feet to the south line of Chairman street; thence east 392.5 feet to the intersection of the south line of Chairman street in the south line of electric avenue; thence tracing the south line of said electric avenue to the county road or Railroad street; thence in a southerly direction tracing the westerly line of said Railroad street to its intersection with the easterly boundary of said South Oregon City No. 3; thence southerly tracing the easterly boundary of said tract to the "point of beginning", said description embracing all of blocks Nos 38, 59, 60, 61, 62, 63, 64, 75 and block "A", also fractional block No 10, also parks, reserves and streets enclosed within said description.

In the matter of the petition of the O & C R R Co for a remission of taxes on taxes on contract lands when the same have been twice paid. This matter coming on to be heard, and the board being fully advised, it is ordered that the clerk of this court upon the request of the sheriff shall draw a warrant on the county in favor of the person producing duplicate receipts for double taxes for any one year for any parcel of said lands except the road and poll tax, which shall in no case be remitted.

In the matter of the resignation of T S Mann as judge of election in Abernethy precinct, it is ordered by the board that said resignation be accepted, and that E F Kennedy be appointed to fill said vacancy.

In the matter of the petition of Charles Cleveland for a tax rebate. Upon the application of Charles Cleveland for a return of taxes erroneously paid in 1891, it is ordered that the clerk issue to him a warrant for the sum of \$14.50.

In the matter of the petition for powder from road district No 4, it is ordered by the board that said petition be granted.
