BACK TO THE ASYLUM. Steven A. Lane Attempts Self-Destruction While in the County Jail. Last Friday the authorities at the Salem insane asylum telegraphed Sheriff Cooke to take into captivity one Steven A. Lane of Clackamas, who was committed from that place four years ago. Cooke secured his man and confined him in the county jail last Saturday, where he made a violent attempt at self-destruction that night. He was discovered in the attempt by deputy sheriff J. E. Jack, who prevented him from committing the rash act. He was making an effort to sever an artery, and was bleeding profusely when discovered. Prior to his endeavor to bleed himself to death, the lunatic wrote a note stating his grievances and the cause of his desire to end his life, stating that he was ill-treated at the asylum and that the doctors were simply conspiring to hold him there until death, when they could dissect his body for medical purposes. He also said the asylum was a living 'hell on earth' and that he would rather be dead than to end his days on earth as an inmate of that place.
