

TEACHERS' INSTITUTE.

Instructive Addresses by Prominent Educators.

The regular meeting of the Clackamas County Teachers' Association was held at the Barclay school building, in Oregon City, March 31, 1900.

Called to order at 10:40 a. m. President N. W. Bowland presiding. Miss Chase was appointed secretary for the day. The program was opened by singing "America."

Robert Ginther spoke on the "Public school teacher, his rights and duties." His address showed much thought on the subject. Among other things he said: "School teaching has often been considered merely a stepping stone to something else. This should not be, when we think of the mighty influence over the lives of his pupils, executed by the teacher, when we reflect that pupils are prepared in the public schools to enter any of the other professions, we realize that there is no profession higher than teaching. The fate of our republic rests in the hands of the teacher."

"The teacher should study the issues of the day, should try to keep abreast of the times. He should never allow himself to think that he 'knows it all'; what is needed most is more knowledge—knowledge of animate and inanimate things."

Prof. Wilcox spoke on the same subject. He believes a teacher has all the "rights" he needs. If he does good work it will be recognized, if not, he will also be "recognized." Teaching should not be a profession. One should not allow himself to develop so one-sided that he will be recognized at long range, as a pedagogue. One should endeavor to be as broad-minded as possible.

Prof. Gray believes in the dignity and grandeur of his profession. He is not ashamed of the "ear marks." A teacher should feel honored, when recognized as one.

By special request, Prof. Zinser gave a talk on Botany which proved most interesting and instructive.

Afternoon Session.

Mrs. Clark Ganong, Mrs. Nelson Lawrence and Miss Imogen Harding sang "Forget Me Not" in an artistic manner.

Mrs. Clark Ganong favored the audience with a solo, which was enthusiastically received.

Mrs. Robert Miller gave a Shakespearean reading. "The Merchant of Venice," which was an intellectual treat. Her explanations seemed almost to give life to the different characters. Shylock especially, appeared in a new, and much better light.

On motion, association adjourned to meet again the last Saturday in April.
