AQUATIC SUICIDE.

Body of an Unknown Man Lodges in the Meshes of a Fish-Net.

Deputy fish commissioner, M. F. McCown, who constantly keeps his eagle eye along the river for illegal fishermen, was notified last Saturday afternoon by Rodney Magone that the body of a drowned man was lodged in the meshes of a net, near Magone Place, on the west side, about two miles below this city.

Mr. McCown and Mr. Magone proceeded to take the body from the water, and immediately notified Coroner M. C. Strickland, who had the body brought to town the next day.

The body proved to be that of a light complexioned man of about 35 years of age; short, stubby beard of about two weeks growth; dressed in a shabby, dark suit and weighed about 180 pounds.

It was a clear case of suicide, as his hat, coat and shoes were found on the bank, and he had been seen a short time prior to his drowning, sitting on a bulkhead which extends out into the river, where it is believed he jumped from. Nothing was found upon his person that would tend to reveal his identity.

The coroner's jury brought in a verdict of suicide by drowning and he was buried Monday afternoon at the county's expense.
