

POLITICAL WEDDING.

Carriers from both sides announced their readiness to meet in joint convention...

Mayor C. D. Latourette was called forth from the great throng of delegates...

On motion of Hiram Straight the delegates of the separate democratic and populist conventions were admitted as delegates...

Secretary A. W. Cheney, of the democratic convention and W. W. Austin, of the populist convention, were made assistant secretaries of the joint assembly.

The following committee was appointed in order of business: C. Schuchel, John Daly, J. S. Carter, Henry Theissen, Eugene Hodges.

The following committee was appointed on platform and to select a name for the joint convention: Louis Funk, Robert Miller, George Ogle, T. R. A. Sellwood, O. W. Robbins.

As a name for the joint convention, it was suggested that it be called a "Citizens' Convention," and that name was finally adopted...

While the committee on platform was deliberating, the election of three candidates for representatives to the state legislature was taken up.

On motion of Mr. Hargreaves, the committee were required to appear before the convention and make short speeches...

An adjournment was then taken until 7:30 o'clock p. m.

The convention was called to order at 7:30. The platform committee not being ready to report, balloting on candidates for the legislative ticket was deferred until later...

After two ballots, on motion of Schuchel, Stehman and Turner were declared elected by acclamation.

Sheriff—J. J. Cooke, named by Hiram Straight. Declared elected by acclamation on motion of William Barlow.

Clerk—E. H. Cooper, present deputy clerk, put in nomination by Hiram Straight, and elected by acclamation.

Recorder—Nominations and balloting resulted as follows: G. Grazier, Barlow, 21; H. Theissen, Milwaukie, 237; George Owings, Needy, 14; H. Theissen was elected.

Treasurer—Alfred Lewelling, 145; H. J. Harding, of Oregon City, 67; O. D. Eby, Marquam, 73.

On motion, Lewelling's nomination was made unanimous.

Assessor—Fox, Beaver Creek, 10; H. Brethaupt, Damascus, 12; Longstreet Vaughan, Molalla, 238; Marks, Mark's Prairie, 10.

Vaughn declared elected by unanimous choice of the convention.

School superintendent—Shirley Buck, 222; Robert Guither, 53.

Shirley Buck was declared elected.

Corner—Dr. M. C. Strickland, Oregon City; Dr. J. W. Powell, Oregon City were nominated. The voting resulted as follows:

J. W. Powell, 125; M. C. Strickland, 151. M. C. Strickland elected.

On motion a clause was added to the platform, requiring the county printing to be let out to the lowest bidder; also the resolution asking legislative action regarding number of hours work per day and days per week required by manufacturers.

Voting for three representatives to the state legislature was next taken up. It was decided that the three candidates receiving the highest number of votes, providing such number constituted a majority, should be declared the nominees of the convention.

Ballots were cast, the result being as set forth in the list.

J. W. Loder was nominated justice of the peace of Oregon City district No. 4, and Tom Hankins received the nomination for constable.

CITIZENS TICKET. Following is the citizens ticket nominated at the joint convention held last Friday:

Treasurer—Alfred Lewelling (pop), Oregon City. Commissioners—Levi Stehman (pop), Molalla; and T. L. Turner (dem), Tualatin. School Superintendent—Shirley Buck (dem), Canby. Corner—Dr. M. C. Strickland (dem), Oregon City. Surveyor—D. F. Warner (pop), Currieville.

PLATFORM ADOPTED. We, your committee appointed on the part of the citizens' convention of Clackamas county, would respectfully recommend the following platform:

Resolved, That we believe in returning to the policy of the fathers, to the end that the Declaration of Independence shall be the source of our political inspiration and of our patriotism and to the end that the constitution of the United States shall remain the sheet anchor and safeguard of our liberties.

Resolved, That we denounce the imperialistic tendencies of the republican party, and in the broken promises of the present administration to the people we recognize this party as an enemy of good government.

Resolved, That we denounce the McKinley administration for its action in passing the Puerto Rican tariff bill and view with alarm and disfavor this attempted subversion of our national constitution.

Resolved, That we favor the issuance of all monies by the government; that we favor municipal ownership; that we favor the abolition of all class legislation, and that we favor the election of senators by a direct vote of the people.

Resolved, That we sympathize with the Boers of the South African republic in their struggle for liberty and national existence.

Resolved, That we are in favor of the initiative and referendum, and pledge our legislatures to work and vote for the pending amendment to the end that it be submitted to a vote of the people.

We demand honest and efficient administration of county affairs on the part of our county officials, and that the county printing be let to the lowest bidder.

We are unalterably opposed to boss rule in county, state and national affairs. We welcome to our aid all good citizens in this our effort to put patriotism above party and to make civic virtues the key note to party success.

Resolved, That the Oregon legislative assembly be asked to pass a law making it a penalty for manufacturers to work their hands more than six days per week or more than 12 hours on one shift.

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Death of Charles Logus. Charles Logus, an old resident of Portland fell from his buggy while driving near the mill of the Western Lumber Company at noon Monday, and when he was picked up he was dead. A sudden attack of heart disease is assigned as the cause of his unexpected taking off.

Mr. Logus had been in apparently good health, and the news of his death was a severe shock to his relatives and friends. The body was taken to the morgue, from which it was soon removed to the family residence, on Ninth and Flanders streets.

Mr. Logus had been identified with the growth of Portland for many years. He was born in Germany 72 years ago, and came to New York in 1853. Three years later he removed to California, and the following year, 1857, came to Oregon.

In the early days, when East Portland was a struggling village and the Stark street ferry was the principal means of crossing the Willamette river at Portland, Mr. Logus and Joseph Burkhard, the latter now a resident of Los Angeles, erected a building on East Washington (then called L street) and East Second streets, and started a pork-packing house. The building still stands on this corner. Afterwards Mr. Logus sold out. He erected a row of wooden buildings on Fourth street, north from the corner of East Washington street. These burning down, he put up a brick block on the corner of Union avenue and East Washington street, on the site of the ruined structures. Shortly before the financial slump, in the early '90s, Mr. Logus erected the fine three-story brick on the corner of East Washington street and Grand avenue, at a cost of \$40,000. At that time it was the finest and most costly structure on the East Side, but it nearly bankrupted Mr. Logus. This, with the closing down of the Stark Street ferry, which caused the vacating of all his buildings on Union avenue and on East Washington street west from Union avenue, was a heavy financial blow, but with the return of prosperous times, Mr. Logus hoped to pull out of all his financial difficulties, and would, no doubt, have done so had he lived. The losses of the past 10 years were a severe burden on him. He was a thorough business man, of integrity and energy.

He left a wife and two children, Mrs. Emma Logan and Herman Logus. Mrs. Adolph Burkhardt was his sister, and he had many other relatives in Portland.—Oregonian.

Mr. Logus was a brother of Julius Logus, who died suddenly in this city about nine years ago, also father of Herman Logus of the firm of Albright & Logus, and uncle of Will Logus, Mrs. Geo. Warner and Mrs. Harry Moody of this city.
