county road at a certain corner-stone in the road known as the Panky road, in Clackamas county, Oregon. Said petitioner filed his affidavit of notices posted, showing that the same was duly and regularly done in accordance with law, and the board being fully advised, referred the matter to W. H. Connell, road master, and that he view said road line as described and report to the board at its next session.

In the matter of the petition of Chas. Hanson to retain bicycle fund of Pleasant Hill precinct path in said precinct—Petition granted. Therefore, it is ordered that all bicycle taxes due and collectible in Pleasant Hill precinct be held for and paid out upon properly audited accounts upon the bicycle path of said precinct.

In the matter of the petition of Mrs. DeBeauvoir for aid—It is ordered that she be allowed the sum of \$10 for the month of March, 1900, and that a warrant be issued for the same, and that the board take the matter of further allowance under advisement until the 23d inst.

In the matter of the petition of Blanch Sieder for a rebate of taxes for the year 1899—The court being fully advised in the matter by the appearance of John E. Sieder and Blanch Sieder by petition, it is ordered that the assessment of said parties for the year 1899 be reduced from \$950 to \$580, making a reduction in their tax from \$29.00 to \$18.50, and the sheriff is hereby authorized to make said reduction upon the assessment roll.

In the matter of the report of viewers on the petition of G. A. Arndt et al for a county road—In the matter of the report of Charles Wilson, Ed Schmitt and A. Bramer, viewers appointed at the last term of this board to view and locate a county road situated in Clackamas county, Oregon, described as follows: Commencing at a first post 7 inches in diameter, 4 feet out of the ground, firmly set, marked R. I. P. (road initial point), the same being a post supporting the railing along the graded approach to the bridge across Pudding river at Aurora near the foot of the hill, from which a first 36 inches in diameter bears north 17 degrees east 306 links distance, marked R I P B T, a cedar 5 inches in diameter bears south 17 degrees 30 minutes east 50 links distance, marked R I P B T; thence 1 run north 7 degrees 4 minutes east 4.71 chains; thence north 38 degrees east 4.93 chains; thence north 13 degrees 42 minutes west 6.87 chains; thence north 38 degrees west 2.54 chains; thence north 27 degrees 30 minutes east 1.69 chains; thence north 33 degrees 30 minutes east 55.28 chains; thence north 33 degrees 30 minutes east 14.36 chains;

thence north 89 degrees 45 minutes east to an iron rod; thence north 47 degrees 6 minutes east parallel to center line of Oregon and California railway and 50 feet distant from north line of right of way of same, the same being the division line of lands owned by Mrs. W. W. Irwin and said railway company, to its intersection with the Canby and Barlow road, to an iron rod. Said viewers filed their report, showing that they had met on the day of —, a day named in the notice served upon them, and were duly sworn by subscribing to a written oath of office administered by John W. Meldrum, the deputy county surveyor, after which they proceeded to the designated place and did view and cause to be surveyed by said county surveyor the above described road. They also filed the field notes and plat of the survey. Said viewers report favorably to the establishment of said road as viewed and surveyed, for the reason that it is a good, practical route and of public utility. Malatt, viewers appointed at the last term of this board to view and locate a county road situated in Clackamas county, Oregon, described as follows: Commencing at a point where the county line between sections Nos. 20 and 29 cross the Molalla road in township 4 south, range 2 east of the Willamette meridian, running east on said line to a stake marked X at the foot of the Trullinger hill; thence following the present traveled road, known as the Milk Creek road, east to Meadow Brook, Clackamas county, Oregon. Said viewers filed their report, showing that they had met on a day named in the notice served upon them, and were duly sworn by subscribing to a written oath of office administered by John W. Meldrum, deputy county surveyor, after which they proceeded to the designated place and did view and cause to be surveyed by said deputy county surveyor the above described road. They also filed the field notes and plat of the survey. Said viewers report favorably to the establishment of said road as viewed and surveyed, for the reason that it is a good, practical route and of public utility. Said report was read on this day on its first reading and laid over for a second reading tomorrow.
