REPUBLICANISM.

Some Planks in the National Platform.

Administration leaders have agreed upon the issues and articles of republican faith which will be incorporated in the national platform to be submitted to the Philadelphia convention for ratification. A rough draft of the republican party creed has been accepted by republican leaders of the senate and Republican National committee.

The opening declaration will be a hearty endorsement of President McKinley and a tribute to his personal management of the most brilliant military and naval achievements of the close of the century. Unqualified approval will be accorded to all the Administrative acts. The establishment of a gold standard will be dwelt upon, and a plank will be devoted to renewed allegiance to the gold standard.

The keynote of the platform will be the expansion issue. A strong, clear utterance in favor of the retention of the Philippines and of a vigorous foreign policy will be declared. There will be no positive affirmation of the right of this Government to govern the Philippines, as that must be left for further adjudication. The policy of protection will be affirmed, and the platform will pledge the party to the support of the doctrine of reciprocity. A greater merchant marine and liberal pension laws will be demanded, and the Monroe Doctrine reasserted. The Nicaragua Canal will be supported, if no action is taken at this session of congress. The developments of the near future in Cuba and the outcome of the municipal elections next month will largely shape the policy toward that island.

Among other planks in the platform will be one in favor of an augmented navy, others in favor of civil service, free from homesteads, restriction of immigration, and temperance and woman suffrage will also have a place in the platform.

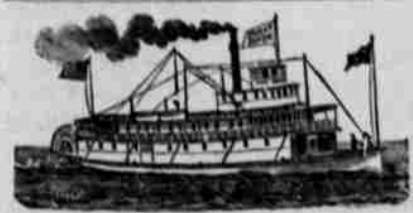

Republican State Platform.

Following is the platform adopted:

"The Republicans of Oregon, in convention assembled, reaffirm their belief in and loyalty to the gold standard. We commend the Republican Congress for its recent legislation making the gold standard a part of the statutory law of the land. So long as either of our great political parties advocates the free coinage of silver, the maintenance of the gold standard is the most important political issue, affecting as it does the value of the farmer's crop and the laborer's wages. We call upon all who believe in sound money to unite with the Republicans of Oregon in the important elections of this year, in order that a victory may be won for the gold standard so decisive as forever to preclude the debasement of our currency by the free coinage of silver.

"We endorse the policy of the Administration in securing the Philippines Islands and demand that they shall be retained as American territory. We have confidence that the American people without departing from their traditions, will give security to personal and property rights, justice, liberty and equality before the law to all who live beneath its flag.

"We endorse the policy of the Administration in suppressing the insurrection in the Philippines, headed by Aguinaldo. We point with pride to the honorable part played by the Second Oregon Regiment in this war. They met with victory in every combat and covered their state and country with glory on every field. We condole with the families of those members of the regiment who lost their lives in the conflict and extend our congratulations to the survivors of the regiment on the brilliant and honorably record they have made.

"We regard trade with the Orient as one of the great sources of our national wealth in the future, and an open door in China as an important aid to the growth of our trade in the Orient. We commend the successful efforts of the present Administration, and especially of its Secretary of State, to secure by treaty with the several European powers the right to the free introduction of American goods into this great Empire.

"The Republican party in Oregon recognizes the vital necessity of control of the organization and curtailment of capital by the state within its borders, and pledges its support in the approaching Legislature to laws defining and carrying out those objects.

"We are in favor of retrenchment and reform in the expenditure of public money, we pledge the Republican party to favor the enactment of all legislation looking to an economical administration of public affairs.

"We point with pride to the legislation adopted by the last Legislature; it abolished the railroad commission; it reduced the legal rate of interest to 6 per cent; it passed an act for the submission to the people of a constitutional amendment providing for the initiative and referendum; it enacted a registration law for the protection of the purity of the ballot. As experience demonstrates this last act to be cumbersome in some particulars, we pledge the Republican Legislators to make effort for its amendment to the end that the registration of qualified voters may be facilitated.

"We are unalterably opposed to any measure looking to the leasing of the public domain, believing that such a system would have an undoubted tendency to hasten the concentration of land ownership into the hands of a few individuals and against the long established American policy of encouraging home building.

"We are in favor of the immediate construction of a canal between the Atlantic and Pacific at the Isthmus of Panama, and we instruct the Oregon delegates in congress to labor earnestly and continuously for the enactment of such legislation as will lead to the construction and operation of the canal under governmental control.

"We urge the immediate passage of the bill now pending in congress to pension the Indian War Veterans, and we pledge the support of the Oregon delegation in congress to the same."
