THE LOCAL NEWS.

OFFICERS ELECTED.—At the election held last Monday night after the regular meeting of Separate Company F. O. N. G., Leighton Kelley was advanced from 2nd lieutenant to 1st lieutenant and Fred Humphrey was elected 2nd lieutenant.

FUTURE CANDIDATE.—J. T. Milner, fusion candidate for joint representative for Multnomah and Clackamas counties, was in the city Wednesday circulating a petition which he will present to the authorities at Salem, permitting Tom Green to become a candidate for supreme judge by petition, Wm. Hamner, regular fusion nominee, refusing to make the run.

BICYCLE PATH.—Under the supervision of supervisor J. F. Clark, work was begun Monday on the bicycle path leading from Parkplace to Milwaukie. The road is to be worked from both ends when completed between the above named places, which will extend it from Portland to Oregon City. It is then the intention to interest the wheelmen in a movement to further extend the path in a southerly direction toward Salem.

SCARCITY OF TEACHERS.—A gentleman who has just returned from a trip to Eastern Oregon states that while there, in Harney county, he found that there was a scarcity of teachers for the public schools. Proceedings of Regular April Term, 1900.

Present, S. F. Marks, J. R. Morton and R. Scott, commissioners; Elmer Dixon, clerk; J. J. Cooke, sheriff.

In the matter of the petition of D. C. Ball for rebate of taxes—This matter coming on to be heard, on the written petition of D. C. Ball filed herein, praying for a rebate of taxes for the years 1896, 1897 and 1898 upon lands in the Oregon and California railway belt, which were in litigation, said taxes not having been paid upon account of and in accordance with an order made by the county court of Clackamas county, state of Oregon, on the 4th day of June, 1896, and the board being fully advised, it is now ordered that the petitioners be allowed to pay said taxes for said years without payment of any costs or penalty.

In the matter of the resignation of Phil T. Ostfield as clerk of election in Milwaukie precinct—Phil T. Ostfield having filed his resignation in writing as clerk of the election board of Milwaukie precinct, and the board being fully advised, it is ordered that the resignation of said Phil T. Ostfield be accepted and that Wm. Starkweather, of said Milwaukie precinct, be appointed to fill said vacancy upon said election board.

In the matter of the petition for a bicycle path in and near Canby—This matter coming on to be heard upon the petition of H. A. Sleight et al filed herein, together with a plat and description of the proposed bicycle path, and the court being fully advised, it is ordered that said petition be granted.

In the matter of the election of clerk Cascade precinct—This matter coming on to be heard, and it appearing to the board that H. McInnis was appointed at the January session of the board as clerk of election in Cascade precinct, but afterwards and during said January term there was a change made in the precinct lines between Cascade and Seivers precincts whereby H. McInnis was transferred and set off from Cascade into Seivers precinct and by reason thereof could not be competent to act on said election board in Cascade precinct; therefore, it is ordered that the name of H. McInnis be stricken from the list on said board and that Ira R. Dodge be appointed to fill the vacancy created thereby.

In the matter of election clerks in Viola precinct—This matter coming on to be heard and it appearing to the board that at the January term, in the appointment of clerks of the election board of Viola precinct, J. A. Randolph and W. H. Mattson were appointed as clerks upon said board, and it further appearing to the board that both of said clerks are of the same political faith, which is in direct opposition to the election laws of this state; it is therefore ordered that the name of J. A. Randolph be stricken from said board and that A. Richardson be appointed to fill the vacancy. Board adjourned till tomorrow.

APRIL 6, 1900.

The board met pursuant to adjournment, the board and officers present as of yesterday, April 5th.

The minutes of that day being read and approved, now on this day the following business was had, to-wit: In the matter of the petition of J. R. Shaner et al to work on the Molalla and Marquam road—This matter coming on to be heard upon the petition of J. R. Shaner et al filed herein whereby said petitioners agree to work upon the road described in said petition, under the county road master, the number of days set opposite their names for one-half the customary price per day paid by the county for work upon the roads, and the court being fully advised, it is ordered that said petition be granted and that W. H. Connell, county road master, be furnished with a certified copy of said

petition and that he be hereby authorized to demand of said petitioners the amount of labor therein subscribed and upon the roads therein described.

In the matter of the fill in Bear creek slough—This matter coming on to be heard upon the report of the road master, W. H. Connell, the board being fully advised, it is ordered that said report be adopted and that the improvement be made in accordance therewith.

In the matter of the resignation of J. Siever as judge of election in Abernethy precinct—This matter coming on to be heard and it appearing to the board that J. R. Siever has duly filed his resignation herein, it is ordered that said resignation be accepted and that B. S. Bellomy be appointed to fill the vacancy created thereby.

In the matter of road work by supervisors—It is hereby ordered that supervisors of any and all road districts do not use more than 50 per cent of their apportionment of road money without further orders from the board.

In the matter of clerk of election in Maple Lane precinct—This matter coming on to be heard and it appearing to the board that at the January term, in the appointment of clerks for the election board at Maple Lane precinct, A. Cramer and J. H. Darling were appointed as clerks upon said board, and it further appearing to the board that both of said clerks are of the same political faith, which is in direct opposition to the election laws of this state, it is hereby ordered that the name of A. Cramer be stricken from the said board and that W. W. Meyers be appointed to fill the vacancy created thereby.

In the matter of claims for scalp bounties for March, 1900—The board having examined said claims, they are hereby ordered paid as follows, to-wit:
