CAPACITY INCREASES.—Under the efficient management of Superintendent J. W. Brown, the tannery in this city is be-

coming one of the largest and most beneficial concerns. It has far exceeded the expectations of Mr. Jacobs as a valuable annex to the woolen mills and also as a profit paying investment. The tannery is now turning out about a half thousand skins daily, and their leather is of the highest grade. Their orders are consigned to Boston and New York and they are constantly behind, the demand being greater than the present supply. Mr. Brown has inaugurated a new process of tanning known as the Chrome method. After leather is prepared in this new manner it is not susceptible to the effects of sealing water. About 4,000 pounds of wool per day is fleeced from the pelts, and this comparatively new business promises to become one of the city's leading industries. There are now about 30 hands employed in the tannery.

AN UP-HILL JOB.

Can the Democratic Donkey Fall the Handwagon Over Republican Majorities!

Clackamas county has a voting population of 5,114. A general political canvass indicates that about 4,180 citizens will vote at the approaching June election. The county is republican by a majority that ranges from 116 to 389. The following is a conservative estimate of the number of votes that will be cast in the separate precincts the 4th day of June by each party:

This will give the republicans a majority of 108, which is the general average majority over all the votes cast for all the different state and county offices, computed upon Governor T. T. Geer's big plurality of 389 down to M. C. Strickland's close plurality of 11 votes.
