

COUNTY COMMISSIONERS.

Proceedings of Regular April Term, 1900.

Present, B. F. Marks, J. B. Morton and R. Scott, commissioners; Elmer Dixon, clerk; J. J. Cooke, sheriff.

(Continued from last week.)

In the matter of the petition of J. W. Higgins et al for a change in the Milwaukee and Foster road—in the matter of the petition filed by J. W. Higgins et al and more than 12 householders of the county living in the vicinity of the proposed road as described in the petition and praying viewers to be appointed to view and locate a county road in Clackamas county, Oregon, described in full as follows: Commencing at the side of bridge on Winnie place on the Milwaukee and Foster road, thence running northeast on the most practicable route to the section line between sections 22 and 5, the same being the town line between township 1 south, range 2 east, and township 2 south, range 2 east; thence east on the south side of said section line to its intersection with said Milwaukee and Foster road. By making these changes in location, the improvement about to be made will be completed at much less cost than if the road was improved on the old location. Said petitioners filed his affidavit of notices posted respecting said road, showing that there had been posted one on the courthouse bulletin board and three in three of the most public places in the vicinity of the proposed road, more than 30 days prior to the presentation of this petition. He also filed a bond for \$100. The board being fully advised, it is ordered that R. S. McLaughlin, Theodore Higgins and John Wise be and are hereby appointed viewers, to meet at place of beginning on the 10th day of May, 1900, and subscribe to a written oath of office administered by E. F. Hands, a skillful surveyor, he being appointed by the board to survey said road, before proceeding to view and locate said road, and report in writing at the next regular term of this board.

In the matter of the purchase of office stationery by the county officers—it is ordered by the board that the county officers shall buy no more of said stationery without an order from the board.

In the matter of the erroneous assessment of John Errion—Now comes John Errion and represents to the board that he has been erroneously assessed, and the board being fully advised, it is ordered that the sheriff be instructed to accept \$9.50 in full for said Errion's taxes for the year 1899.

In the matter of the petition of J. A. Richey et al for plank on the Bradley and Richey road in said district No. 5—it is ordered by the board that said petition be granted and that the county will permit plank for one mile of said road, plank to cost \$4.75 per thousand, and Mr. Stone, the man who furnished the plank, is to donate \$20 toward the cost of said plank.

In the matter of the petition of B. F. Linn for the opening up of the Linn Mill road—it is ordered by the board that said petition and subscription list be accepted and that the county donate \$100 toward said improvement and to furnish powder and fuse asked for. It is further ordered that William Harris be appointed to supervise said work.

In the matter of the bill of W. E. Markell, from road district No. 35—it is ordered by the board that said bill be allowed, and the clerk is hereby ordered to draw a warrant on the general fund for said amount.

CHARLES TOOLE

TURKEY DOING NOTHING.

Leta Indemnity Matter Rest-Fund for Indian Famine.

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 6.—The United States Legation is doing nothing in the indemnity matter, which apparently is forming the subject for communication between the Yildix Kiosh and the Turkish Minister in Washington.

Rear Admiral Ahmed Pasha, who an Imperial trade, issued April 25, ordered to proceed to the United States to study the construction of warships, has not left Constantinople.

The Sultan raised the formation of a committee to raise a fund for the relief of the Indian famine victims. It is thought that this will go to neutralize the effect of the recent arrests and exile of members of the young Turkish party.


