DECORATION DAY.

Floral Tributes to be Placed on the Graves of the Departed.

As the Memorial season is at hand the commander of Meade Post No. 2, G. A. R. publishes this general order for the information of the comrades and the general public.

The customary Memorial service will be held in the Presbyterian church, on Sunday, May 27, at 10:30 a. m. Rev. A. J. Montgomery, preaching the sermon and having full charge of the exercises. Lawton Command, No. 1, U. V. U and the veterans of the Second Oregon have accepted invitations to accompany the Post and Relief Corps to this service. Co. A 2d Reg O. N. G. has kindly consented to act as escort.

On Wednesday May 30 the usual exercises of Memorial Day will occur, consisting of a parade, a memorial oration by the Hon. G. E. Hayes, delivered at Shively's opera house, when appropriate music will be rendered.

After the exercises at the opera house the column will move to the cemetery where the ritual ceremonies of the G. A. R. will be performed by the Post, and an address to the "Unknown Dead" by the Rev. E. S. Bollinger, after which the graves of our deceased comrades will be decorated.

Invitations will be sent to the various fraternal societies of the children of the schools.

A cordial and hearty invitation is extended to all ex-soldiers and sailors, veterans of any of the wars of the country to unite with us in worthily honoring our patriot dead.

The exercises of the day will be under the direction of the grand marshal, Lieut. J. U. Campbell, who will give full directions as to formation of column and order of march in later orders.

All patriotic citizens are earnestly requested to unite with us in the services of this memorial occasion. Comrades, for thirty-two years we have kept this day in loving memory of our departed brothers, in-arms. Let us still remember the pledge of our own Logan, of glorious memory:
