TO CLACKAMAS HEADWATERS.—An eight-horse pack train arrived in this city last Wednesday, with J. J. Davis, of Garfield, in charge. It was laden with supplies to be consumed by Field Superintendent E. C. Greenman and his under-deputies, F. W. Greenman, A. Mead, H. Ostin and J. Hatton. They are off to the headwaters of the Clackamas, where they will reestablish the now idle hatchery at that place. It is also their intention to construct a substation on Warm Spring creek, three miles below. Racks will be placed in the hatchery sufficient to hatch 10,000,000 eggs. Mr. Greenman expects to mark 5,000 young salmon this season by clipping the tale and also the adipose fin. Later in the season they will make a tour of the Coos and Umpqua rivers, where they will erect hatcheries.
