ABERNETHY ROAD.—Laborers are laying the plank furnished by the county, on the Abernethy road. W. H. Mattoon, who is one of the principal promoters of this needed improvement was in from Viola during the week, and states that the Vosburg grade has been reduced from a 25 per cent to a 4 per cent grade. It will be remembered that at this particular place is one of the most dangerous pieces of road in the county. About three years ago Matthew Richardson lost his life there and both of his horses were killed. Numerous other accidents have occurred on this strip of thoroughfare, and credit will be recorded to those who are faithfully working for the general improvement of this road. Mr. Mattoon also states that \$300 has been secured by subscription throughout the county and with a trifle more aid from the county court the road will be put in first class condition all the way to Viola.

CENSUS QUERIES.—The blank schedules to be used in the next census are now being distributed by the Census Office to the enumerators, who will start to work on June 1. The schedules contain questions which some persons may think prying, purposeless, or excessive in number. But their number and character have been determined by congress, not by the Census Office, and all of them have been asked by previous censuses. Some mothers may shrink from stating the number of children they have had, and the number who are living. But from the answers to these questions, the country will learn whether the native American population is holding its own, or whether, as some have claimed, it is being gradually supplanted and displaced by the children of recent immigrants. The enumerators of this county should strive to enroll every person within its scope, as it will give Clackamas third place among the counties of the state.

REPUBLICAN LANDSLIDE

Fusionists Concede the Election of the Republican County Ticket. The magd of the fusion persuasion have at last sniffed the smoke of defeat, that is issuing from the burning crater of the Clackamas county Republican volcano, whose mouth is issuing forth the fire of commercial activity, the smoke of manufacturing industry and the lava of general prosperity. Like the old woman who attempted to sweep back the ocean billows, the fusion steering committee have been trying to absorb the tidal wave of republican majorities that threatens to sweep down upon them June the 4th and submerge their entire county ticket in a deluge of honest votes. The double-barreled party have foreseen their downfall in the coming election, and with the hope of saving the sheriff and representative they have ceded the remainder of the ticket to the republicans and are endeavoring to concentrate their entire strength for Hedges and Cooke. The last week has proved that this scheme has utterly failed and that the republican candidates will go through from constable to congressman. Secretary Cheney has been trying to make the democratic donkey trot in double harness with the the populist bovine, but the pole is kicking over the traces for expansion and new pastures green, while the pop-cow is bellowing out against "The Editor's" 200-percent chopped bill for county printing. Every precinct in the county is from 15 to 20 percent more favorable for a republican landslide this election than it was two years ago, and the majorities will range from 200 to 1,000.

Campaign Closes.

The republicans will bring their campaign to a close in this county by a roving meeting in Oregon City. They intend having good speakers from abroad as well as local talent, present at the armory on Saturday, June 2, at 8 p. m. Everybody who can should attend this meeting and hear reasons why the republican party should receive the suffrage of the voters of Oregon City on June 4, 1900. There are many questions which every voter must decide for himself when he goes to the polls, but the chief one is, does he want the present prosperity to continue or does he want to go back to conditions that existed from 1892 to 1896. Every vote cast from congressman to constable will have its influence the one way or the other. Which side will your influence be with?
