## BATTLE OF BALLOTS

Oregon Fires the Signal Gun for  
McKinley.

STATE REPUBLICAN BY 10,000.

Clackamas County Divides Honors—  
500 Votes Short.

Proclaim to the world that Oregon's  
June election was a complete triumph  
for republican principles. While Clack-  
amas county has divided her honors  
about equally between fusion and re-  
publicanism, yet there is that healthful  
glow and ruddy complexion given the  
legislative, state and congressional  
tickets that cannot be counted for aught  
but a sweeping McKinley victory in  
November.

The state of Oregon has gone republi-  
can by increased majorities over '98 as  
is seen by the cases of Wolverson for  
supreme judge and Bailey for Dairy and  
Food Commissioner. Their majorities  
far exceed the vote of two years ago  
while the war spirit was alive to swell  
the republican vote to abnormal propor-  
tions.

For Congressman, Tongue in the First  
district has a plurality of 8,000 votes,  
while in 1898 his plurality was but 2037.  
In the Second district Moody's plurality  
is 8200, whereas in 1898 he won by only  
6057. These figures show that it has  
been a notable republican victory.  
Local issues mixed in the election of  
members of the legislature, so that the  
increased republican vote is not so ap-  
parent in those officers, but the legisla-  
ture is strongly republican. From only  
one county of the state has the com-  
plete unofficial return been reported—  
Benton. For all others, including  
Multnomah, the figures are more or less  
incomplete.
