Geo. C. Brownell's Address.

Speaking of Memorial exercises observed in that city, the Roseburg Plaindealer says:

"About 10:30 a. m. on the arrival of the procession consisting of the G. A. R., ladies of the G. A. R., ladies of the Relief Corps and Co. E., at the opera house the exercises began—the G. A. R. ritual exercises conducted by the past commander being first on the program. This was followed with music by the band and prayer by the chaplain, Comrade Churchill. After the singing of "America" by the entire assemblage, and music, "Hail Columbia" by the band, the speaker, Hon. Geo. C. Brownell, was introduced by the past commander, and for an hour the large audience was held in wrapt attention by his eloquence. He reviewed our nation's struggle from Lexington to the present war in the Philippines and eulogized old and young veterans alike. The speaker was frequently applauded and his address was declared one of the ablest and most eloquent ever heard on a like occasion in this city. Music by the band concluded the morning exercises at the opera house and it was announced that the afternoon exercises would be held at the Soldiers' home at 2 o'clock. Here Commandant H. S. Shipple opened the exercises in a neat and appropriate address after being introduced by E. D. Howell, post commander. He was followed by the fluent Hon. George C. Brownell, of Oregon City, whose grand, patriot sentiment and sparkling oratory seemed to even eclipse his eloquent effort at the opera house in the forenoon. His address was a revelation and genuine treat to both old and young soldiers as well as to the large assemblage of citizens present."
