We, the undersigned citizens of Oregon City and vicinity hereby severally agree that we will pay to the county court of Clackamas county, Oregon, the sum set opposite our respective names to aid in the construction and completion of a modern road from the lower Clackamas bridge to the Hatchery bridge. The total of our subscription to equal the sum of \$2000.00 The subscriptions above indicated to be on the following terms and conditions:	

First—That the citizens of Logan, Viola, Springwater raise by private subscription, the sum of \$2,500 to aid in the completion of the road from the Hatchery bridge to Tracy's.

Second—That the county court of Clackamas county give a sum of money equal to the aggregate of this subscription, to aid in the completion of the road from the lower Clackamas bridge to the Hatchery bridge, and an additional sum of money equal to all the subscriptions raised in Logan and beyond, to aid in the completion of the road leading into that section as herein indicated, and will cooperate in such work.

### City Council.

At an adjourned meeting of the city council held Monday evening the following business was transacted:

The committee on streets and public property were authorized to purchase 90 yards of crushed rock for street repair.

The cemetery committee were requested to confer with the Odd Fellow and Masonic orders in regard to the construction of a walk along the north side of the cemetery.

The present bicycle path commissioners and their successors in office were granted a right of way for the use of wheelmen beginning in the center line of Center street at a distance of twelve feet southerly from the northerly line of Seventh street; thence running easterly up Seventh street and parallel with the said northerly line of Seventh street to the city limits.

The committee on streets and public property were authorized to purchase 47,250 feet of lumber to be used for repair of county road leading from head of Fifth street in Oregon City.

The Fire board met prior to the council proceedings and transacted business as follows:

Chas. Pope was appointed chief engineer, vice F. T. Rogers, resigned.

M. F. McCown, Caleb Cross, and Hiram Straight were appointed a committee to investigate the duties of the chief engineer and to draft rules and regulations governing the office.

Exempt certificates were granted J. D. Renner, T. S. Lawrence and J. P. Alldredge.

M. F. McCown, Peter Nehren and E. Charman were appointed a committee to look after the repairing of Catact Hose company.
