A strike has occurred among the laborers employed by the Havana Electric Company, Cubans and Spanish, on the ground that they do not receive the same wages as Americans who do similar work. The contractors reply that Americans are worth far more than Cubans.

In the case of Brigam H. Roberts, found guilty of unlawful co-habitation, the judgment of the court was that he pay a fine in the sum of \$150, or in lieu thereof that he be imprisoned in the county jail for a period of 150 days. A 30 days' stay was granted in order that the defendant might file a bill of exceptions.

The Boer envoys now in this country declare the war is not over by any means.

Tuesday, June 26.

The weather in North Dakota is distressingly hot, registering 104 in the shade today. Crops are in a parched condition, indications pointing to a decrease of 15 to 20 per cent since Saturday. Hay selling for \$4.50 last Saturday, sold on the street today for \$16.

Broken in health and spirits, ex-Governor Taylor, Kentucky, started for Niagara Falls tonight. He was accompanied by Mrs. Taylor, and four detectives followed close at his heels. Two of the officers represent the State of Kentucky, and bear warrants for the arrest of Mr. Taylor upon charges growing out of the assassination of Governor Goebel. The other two were employed by Mr. Taylor to guard his person.

The Havana custom-house fraud cases came up again for trial in the courts here today. The consensus of opinion is that conviction is now impossible, as every judge and lawyer concerned has relatives or friends among the accused.

Prohibitionists expect to poll 300,000 votes this fall.

Grosvener reiterates that Quigg mutilated the Philadelphia platform. He possesses the documents and says planks relating to policy and legislation for insular possessions and merchant marine were omitted.

Wednesday, June 27.

More definite and complete returns have lately been received concerning the beach strike at Topkuk, 55 miles below Nome. There seems no reason to doubt that this is one of the greatest strikes ever made in this vicinity, as important as the strike at Nome itself.

Jeff Davis is nominated by the democrats of Arkansas for governor.

The steamer Cottage City arrived today from Skagway with \$200,000 in dust and drafts and a number of passengers from Dawson.

The German government does not yet see any cause to impute bad faith to the Chinese government or to saddle the responsibility upon Pekin for the participation of Chinese troops in the Boxer excesses. At least, all reliable news received here thus far leaves the question of responsibility still open. This view is shared by other powers. For the same reason, the question of dethroning the Empress has not been discussed between the powers.

Two deaths in Philadelphia and one in Chicago were caused today by the excessively hot weather.

Boers in small bands are harassing the large columns of the British. Dewet is leading the guerrilla operators.

Sharkey was knocked out by Gus Rublin in the 15th round. Big sailor went down to his first defeat after a desperate struggle.

Thursday, June 28.

Prohibition platform covers only liquor traffic. McKinley severely scored.

Dewey says Bryan will be elected.

Sultz, Croker and Murphy of New York are summoned to Lincoln, Nebraska, to confer with W. J. Bryan on the vice-presidency question. It means a boom for Sultz.

Nine Filipino generals were released in Manila upon their taking the oath of allegiance to the United States of America.

Dewey is still in the field for the presidency, but would not accept the vice-presidency.
