

Big Suit in Equity.

A suit in equity to determine the property interests of the plaintiff, Mack Howell, in the village of Willamette situated on the river, above Oregon City, has been brought, against the Oregon Iron & Steel Co. as trustees. The property valuation is about \$50,000 of which Howell claims a one-half interest. Mr. Howell is well-known in this community, having been in the employe of the East Side Railway Co. as a motorman for many years.

Following are the allegations of the plaintiff: The plaintiff alleges a defect in title having been made when the property was transferred in 1879, resulting from a clerical error. The plaintiff prays, therefore, for a decree against the defendant, reforming the deeds, whereby the plaintiff may secure an undivided one-half interest in the premises. Following are the main allegations:

That the defendant is a private corporation, duly organized, and doing business under the laws of Oregon.

That on March 14, 1879, Thomas R. Fields was the owner in fee simple of certain (described) real estate, situated in Clackamas county, Or., containing 80 acres, more or less.

That on said day, March 14, 1879, in consideration of the sum of \$800 Thomas R. Fields and wife sold and attempted to convey the described premises to Courtney N. Davidson and Florine A. Davidson, by their certain deed of conveyance.

That said deed was duly recorded in the deed records of Clackamas county.

That by mutual mistake of grantees and grantors, and without their fault, but owing solely to oversight and inadvertence upon the part of the scrivener employed to draw the deed, there were certain mistakes made, namely:

First—The description of the premises did not close and should have been as hereinafter first set out.

Second—That there was therein omitted from the granting clause the words, "as tenants in common," or in other apt words, to create an estate in said grantees of tendency in common between the grantees as was intended by all the parties concerned.

That the plaintiff is now the sole owner by purchase of the undivided one-half interest, as tenants in common, formerly owned by Florine A. Davidson, and the defendant is owner of the undivided one-half interest formerly owned by Courtney N. Davidson, but that defendant purchased his said interest with notice and full knowledge of all the equities of said Florine A. Davidson, which equities were subsequently by deed of conveyance duly transferred to plaintiff.

That notwithstanding such notice and knowledge on the part of the defendant and for the purpose of perfecting a legal or paper title to the premises, the defendant procured a deed of correction, with description hereinafter set forth first from Thomas R. Fields and wife to Courtney N. Davidson, alone, thereby purposely omitting therefrom the name of Florine A. Davidson, her heirs and assigns, and therefore procured said deed of correction to be recorded, and by such means undertook and attempted to defraud the said Florine A. Davidson, her heirs and assigns, of their just and equitable interest in the estate.

That less than two years have elapsed since the discovery of said mistake by plaintiff or any of his predecessors in interest.

The Ladds, of Portland, are principal owners of the estate in question.

civil life. Many vacancies also exist in the navy. To meet these needs many men have been granted permission to appear before the Army boards shortly for examination for commissions as Second Lieutenants. Officers are needed in Cuba and the Philippines, as well as the United States.

Monday, July 2.

Ex-Governor David B. Hill, of New York, accompanied by his private secretary, P. S. McEwan, of Albany, arrived in Kansas City today from St. Louis, having left Albany on Friday. Within two hours after his arrival, Governor Hill departed for Lincoln, Neb., to hold a conference with Mr. Bryan.

The losses sustained in the fire by the North German Lloyd Steamship Company in Hoboken yesterday are tonight conservatively placed at nearly \$10,000,000, and the loss of life, merely guess-work at even this late hour, will reach probably as high as 200, and there are over 300 men in the hospitals in this city, Hoboken and Jersey City, badly burned.

The Indians convicted of the murder of Mr. and Mrs. Horton, of Eugene, Or., at Lynn Canal, last October, were sentenced at Skagway, June 27. Hanson, who killed Horton will hang. Williams, who cut Mrs. Horton's throat, under threats of Hanson, was sentenced to 50 years. Kichitoo also gets 50 years. Another is given 30 years, and two others 20 years each.

The contest for Goddess of Liberty closed today at Junction City. Miss Lorena Cook was elected for Goddess, receiving 432 votes. Miss Helen Chandler receiving 335.

Tuesday, July 3.

Roosevelt is welcomed by democrats and republicans alike on his visit to Oklahoma, where the Rough Riders hold their reunion.

The United States Army transport Southwick, having on board more than 400 female teachers from Cuba, being the third of the fleet bringing the instructors to this country for a season of study at Harvard University's summer school, arrived today. Two more transports are yet to come.

Pernicious fever is prevalent on the Isthmus of Panama, among the victims being the son of United States Consul Cobb and the prima donna of an Italian opera company.

Germany will avow the death of Minister von Kettler. They will insist upon full satisfaction from China.

Wednesday, July 4.

The United States battleship Oregon, which ran ashore off the island of How Ke, in the Mistaun group, 35 miles northwest of Chee Foo, on June 28, has been floated.

The Times, St. Petersburg correspondent says that June 30 the grand staff of the Russian Army estimated the Chinese Army to number 1,720,000 men. He also said that about 900,000 Mausers have been imported within the last three years.

Chicago packers are receiving each day orders from Germany for 100,000 pounds of sausage and canned goods. To get this increased amount of product inspected by the government, they asked for 23 more microscopists.

William B. Curtis, the veteran athlete, who perished in a storm on Mount Washington, N. H., was often called the father of American athletics. He was probably the best-pooped man on amateur sport in the country.

Regarding the story of renewed severe fighting at Tien Tsin, a special dispatch from Shanghai adds that reports are current that Vice-Admiral Seymour has been wounded.

Thursday, July 5.

Rear-Admiral Barker, now commandant of the Norfolk navy-yard, has been selected to succeed Rear-Admiral Philip, deceased, as Commandant of the New York navy-yard.

The thermometer registered 90 degrees steadily throughout the day, with scarcely a breeze to afford the slightest relief. Up to 10 o'clock in New York, eight deaths and four prostrations had been reported.

The grounds on the northerly side of the building are being leveled up for a tennis court etc. Space fifty by one hundred feet is easily available, always almost cool, shady, and particularly inviting during the hot season.

Probably next in importance to the physical department of the association is the Free Public Reading Room. The attendance during the year past aggregates tens of thousands. One hundred a day would aggregate the sum of thirty-six thousand a year not including Sundays. Many days two hundred and more have patronized the reading room and during the winter on ordinary evenings thirty, forty and fifty have often been counted in the room at one time. This is conclusive proof that the public reading room is a beneficial and useful institution in our city and merits the favorable co-operation of the public in its support.

The room is at present supplied with a large collection of periodicals, magazines and dailies, it being the intention to make it a first-class reading room in every respect and to make this department fill the place of a Free Reading Room common in all cities and towns. The public reading room is therefore the one room in the building absolutely free for everybody, there being no qualifications imposed except to keep order and not mutilate papers.

The best room in the building has been set apart for the reading room. Situated in the north-easterly corner of the building, well-lighted, ventilated, with deadened walls and floors, makes it a most comfortable and quiet place for reading and study. The public has free use of and access here to the leading magazines including "The Outlook," "The Munsey," "The Chautauquan," "The American Monthly Review of Reviews," "McClure's," "Self Culture," "Cosmopolitan," "Outing," "Recreation," also other publications such as "The Scientific American," "Harper's Weekly," "Collier's Weekly," "Ram's Horn," "New York Voice," "Printer's Ink," "Judge," "Puck," "Christian Cynosure," etc. Besides these the daily Oregonian, Telegram, Salem Statesman and Albany Herald, and the weekly Enterprise and Courier-Herald are always on file, to the free use of all the above, the public is cordially invited at all times between the hours of 8:30 a. m. and 10 p. m. daily except Sundays. Room open Sundays from 2 to 5 p. m.
