

CHAUTAQUA.

Welcomes Hundreds of Guests Wednesday Morning.

After an appeal to Almighty God by the Rev. Blackburn, of the First Baptist church of Portland, Prof. W. C. Hawley, in his address of welcome, touched the mystic key that set Chautauqua machinery in motion, Wednesday morning at 10:30 o'clock.

Prof. J. B. Horner, of the State Agricultural college responded to Prof. Hawley in a manner that indicated a sincere belief that all are welcome to Chautauqua.

The Chemawa Indians form the only band and orchestral music on the grounds, and are roundly applauded.

The day's program was interspersed with musical productions by Miss Pearl Smith, Prof. Boyer, Miss Dearborne and Mrs. Bushong, which proved sparkling gems and fell upon appreciative ears.

At 3:30 the Oregon City and Canby teams played a game of "school boy" baseball and they batted the two pitchers like beating a punching bag. The errors on both sides piled up as thick as the scores, and after three hours of desperate battle, Canby went down to defeat in a score of 18 to 36.

About 500 people were upon the grounds during the opening day and the crowd was more than twice doubled in the evening to hear Congressman Landis.

Up to Wednesday night there were estimated about 250 campers present, and tenting localities had been reserved by as many more. Weather prognosticate for the good, and the opening day can by no means be taken as a criterion of the constantly increasing crowds that will culminate in an immense concourse of humanity during the later days.

Congressman Landis is a big man mentally. He is the kind of an orator that gives life and hope to the despairing, and prevents suicide from melancholy. His address Wednesday night was an outburst of eloquence, truth, hope, and against canker, sarcasm and irony.

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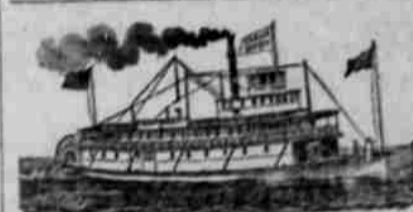
