SHOT BY SEYMOUR

His Men Beg to be Shot Rather Than
Suffer Chinese Torture.

GREAT LACK OF HARMONY.

Serious Friction Reported Between
Allies.

New York, July 16.—A dispatch to
the Journal and Advertiser from Tien
Tsin, July 8, says: Ineffectual attempts
have been made to conceal the horrible
fact that Admiral Seymour was com-
pelled to shoot his own wounded during
the recent disastrous retreat of the Pekin
relief expedition.

All the wounded and prisoners who
fell into the hands of the Chinese were
frightfully tortured. The bodies of two
marines who were captured by the
Chinese were recovered. The bodies
had been cut into pieces. First, the
eyes had been hacked out; then the
cheeks, arms and legs cut off, until
death ended the sufferings of the poor
fellows.

When Admiral Seymour, in his re-
treat, found himself so hard pressed
that he was unable longer to carry his
wounded with him, he asked the men:
"Which do you prefer, to be left to the
mercies of the Chinese or be shot by
your own comrades?"

As Admiral Seymour put the question,
the tears were running down his cheeks.

"We prefer death to torture. Shoot
us now, that we may die like men," was
the piteous response of the helpless men.

A firing squad was told off, and while
the little allied force stopped and beat
off with gas fire the Chinese horde that
surrounded it, inside its lines an act of
mercy was performed, as the firing squad
carried out its orders.

A few merciful volleys from the rifles
in the hands of friends and the har-
assed expedition was relieved of its bur-
den of wounded; the fanatical Chinese
horde was cheated of victims for its tor-
ture, and the sufferings and fears of the
unfortunates were brought to an end in
an honorable death under their own flag.

The British and American forces are
brigaded together on the west side of
the town; the Germans and Japanese on
the south side; the French and Russians
on the north and a force of Cossacks hold
the east side.

Scouts report that Imperial Chinese
troops have arrived from Peking, well
equipped with many guns.

Troops of native cavalry and hordes of
Boxers are coming from the east and
south.

LACK OF HARMONY.

Serious Friction Reported Between
Allies.

LONDON, July 19, 4 a. m.—While evi-
dence accumulates daily that China has
long been preparing a formidable mili-
tary organization in anticipation of the
present conflict and that the area of the
rebellion is continuously extending, har-
mony among the allies, which is to meet
such a grave situation, is still deplorably
lacking. The Russians have refused Ad-
miral Seymour's request to hand over
the restored Taku-Tien Tsin Railway to
the English company, and it is rumored
that Germany purposes taking a serious
independent step, namely, to patrol the
Yangtze Kiang with men-of-war. Such
a step would be greatly resented by Eng-
land. Still more alarming news has
been conveyed to the Daily Express from
Tokyo, to the effect that the apparent re-
luctance of Germany and Russia to con-
sent to a Japanese commander for the
army corps has led the Japanese Govern-
ment to delay the forwarding of the di-
vision already mobilized.

"It is useless any longer to hide from
ourselves the fact that China has de-
clared war on civilization and has plung-
ed into the conflict with rapid frenzy. It
is equally futile to discuss whether hos-
tilities are being waged by the Chinese
Government, in which it is evident that
an alibi-act of some kind exists. Unless
unmistakable evidence exculpating
the Pekin Government is promptly
forthcoming, the powers should treat
China as a belligerent state and act ac-
cordingly."

A similar line of comment is taken by
the other morning papers. All applaud
the course of Count von Below, the Ger-
man Foreign Secretary, in stopping Chi-
nese Legation in Berlin, and all urge
other powers to follow Germany's exam-
ple.

The Russian general staff denies the
report that the Chinese have captured
Blagovestchensk, capital of the Province
of Amur, and it is rumored from Irkutsk
that the Russians have taken Aigon.

A special dispatch from Tien Tsin dis-
tributes the number of those killed at the
capture of the native city as follows:
Russians 100, Japanese 57, British 40
and Americans 37. The correspondent
who sends this asserts that thousands of
Chinese were killed, and that fighting
was still going on when his dispatch was
sent in various parts of Tien Tsin.

In reference to the rumors that Euro-
peans were seen working the Chinese
guns at Tien Tsin, the Standard learns
that eight Russian military instructors,
forcibly detained by the Chinese, were
compelled to work the guns. One es-
caped and reached the Russian lines.

A special correspondent of the Daily
Express at Tien Tsin contrasts the
"splendid work and perfect equipment"
of the Japanese with the "inadequate
supplies of the British, German and
American contingents, which are terribly
lacking in the most obvious necessities."

The first Boxer proclamation has made
its appearance in Shanghai. It declares
that Kwan, the war god, desires the
blood of foreigners, and threatens 10
plagues if the Boxer tenets are not fol-
lowed and spread.

The Governors of the Provinces of Hu-
nan, Hu Pi and Honan have now openly
joined Prince Tuan and are marching
overland with their armies to Peking.

The German relief column, sent into
the interior of the Province of Shan Tung
to endeavor to rescue a party of 30 mis-
sionaries, German, American and Eng-
lish, has returned without having ob-
tained any tidings of their whereabouts,
and it is feared that all have been slain.

A special commission is sitting in St.
Petersburg daily to arrange for the dis-
patch of troops to the far East.

It is announced from Shanghai that
General Nish has been killed, but there
is no confirmation of the rumor from
Tien Tsin. The Consul at Shanghai
have agreed to regard the Viceroy of
Nankin as the chief, so far as the collec-
tion of revenue is concerned. The Vice-
roy, when informed of this attitude, ap-
pointed Mr. Taylor, statistical secretary
of customs, to be Inspector of Customs
ad interim in succession to Sir Robert
Hart.
