WIDE TIRES.—Deputy County Clerk Dixon completed an abstract Tuesday of tax rebates allowed on wide-tired wagons. Up to the present time, it showed that on the 1899 taxes the total sum of \$570.46 had been paid to owners of wide-tire wheels.

BARBERS VS. LAWYERS.—The tonsorial artists of this city have become inoculated with baseball fever and have thrown down the gauntlet for a friendly game with the disciples of Blackstone.

COY WORMS BAD.—W. B. Partlow, of Mount Pleasant, brought to this city this morning a bill of potatoes from his farm, which contained about 20 half-eaten potatoes and as many cutworms.

BOY DROWNED.—Sidney Hughes, the 5-year-old son of Oliver Hughes, was drowned in the Tualatin river, about four miles from Oregon City, yesterday afternoon.

WILL JUMP.—Next Saturday promises to be a gala day in Oregon City. Prof. Frank C. Hill, the celebrated high-diving bridge jumper, is billed to leap from the suspension bridge at this city at 4 o'clock p. m. that day.

MIDNIGHT BLAZE.—The boxed saw-dust casing around the water pipe that leads from the pumping station to the reservoir at Elyville, caught fire last Friday night, and it took quite an effort to extinguish it.

with a force of the Twenty-eighth Volunteer Infantry, who attacked 200 insurgents entrenched two miles east of Taal, killing 28.

The Boers made a determined attack yesterday to destroy a post at Trail Head, 13 miles east of Heidelberg, which they attacked with three guns and a pom-pom and surrounded.

Senor Buenacampo last Thursday sent to Aguinaldo, by means of Aguinaldo's mother, the amnesty resolutions adopted by the meeting of representative Filipinos on June 21, together with General MacArthur's answer to them and other documents bearing upon the restoration of peace.

Tuesday, July 24. A story circulated today, though not credited to Bryan or his visitors, is to the effect that Charles A. Towne will remain on the ticket as the populist candidate for vice president, for the good his candidacy will do in the strongly populist states of Kansas, Nebraska and South Dakota.

At London and at Paris it is reported from Chinese sources that the Ministers in Peking are safe and that the government is taking steps to send them to the coast. With these come the usual stories of massacre of all foreigners in Peking.

General Dewet has cut Lord Roberts' communications and captured 100 Highlanders. There is nothing in the extensive report of Admiral Seymour, which was received here today by the America Maru, to prove the sensational story that was circulated the early part of this month to the effect that the Admiral, who commanded the Peking relief expedition, killed his wounded to save them from the Chinese.

Although the orders have not yet been issued, it is pretty generally understood in military circles that Brigadier-General Fred Grant, United States Volunteers, and Adjutant-General Thomas Barry, have been selected for assignment to duty in China.

Wednesday, July 25. A regiment of militia was called out yesterday morning to protect the non-union fishermen on Fraser River, nearly 4000 of whom were prevented from working by 600 union strikers.

Sir Claude MacDonald's message, dated July 4, appealing for relief, is regarded in London as only a prelude to the absolute confirmation of the massacre. This is the opinion also of the Japanese Minister here.

The Kansas Populist convention refused to endorse Jerry Simpson's senatorial candidacy. The three silver parties have agreed upon fusion.

Particulars of the fighting at and capture of Tien Tsin are at hand, and show that the Ninth Infantry suffered terribly. There is some inclination on the part of correspondents to censure Liacum.

The Chinese Minister at Washington received a dispatch from Sheng, the Director of Telegraphs, stating that the foreign ministers are to be sent to Tien Tsin under escort; also that the Imperial Government has not only been protecting them, but has supplied them with food.
