This particular plant contains several flowers that measure 15 inches across the petals. The name "night-blooming cereus" is especially applied to the cereus grandiflorus, which is cultivated for its beautiful, short-lived flowers. The cereus giganteus, whose columnar trunk is sometimes 60 feet in height, is a striking feature of the scenery of New Mexico and Texas. The plant was obtained from a slip presented by Dr. Carter, the famous pill autocrat.

WOOLEN MILLS.

Much Conjecture About The Big Transfer.

The transfer of the big woolen mills of this city is now the subject of much comment and conjecture.

While delivery of possession by Jacobs Bros. to Brown Bros., will not occur until the first of this month, yet all but a few of the minor details of the big transfer have been agreed upon. Included in the sale of the mills is all the machinery, water power, wool and woolen goods. It is estimated that the mill property, together with all appurtenances thereto, is worth \$500,000. The Brown's have no experience in the operation of woolen mills, and will place in charge of the concern Mr. Smith, of San Francisco, who is now in the city.

Several rumors are afloat to the effect that Jacobs Bros. will operate a new mill, either in this city or at Portland. It is urged that they could not embark in the enterprise in this city on the grounds that they could not secure sufficient water power, the present mills having a privilege of 500 horsepower. This argument is killed by others, who maintain that electricity and steam could be applied, and further citing that Jacobs Bros., own property just across the street from their former mills.

It is the general impression, however, that if a new mill is constructed by Jacobs Bros. it will not be in this city.
