In the matter of the report of John W Meldrum, deputy county surveyor on the Baker's Ferry and Cason's bridge road. Report filed by John W Meldrum as to the survey of above named road for improvement by W H Council, it is ordered that said report be adopted, and the expense thereon filed be allowed:

In the matter of the report of John W Meldrum, deputy county surveyor, on the Baker's Ferry and Engala mill road—Report filed by John W Meldrum for re-surveying said road as per order of A W Cooke for the improvement of said road. It is ordered that said report be accepted, and that the expense account of same be allowed:

In the matter of the report of John W Meldrum, deputy county surveyor on the grade of Burt's hill—Now comes John W Meldrum and files his report of the survey of the grade on the Burt hill on the Warren and Parrot creek road in accordance with an order heretofore made by the board. It is ordered that said report be approved and the expense account allowed:

In the matter of the petition of Albert Moshberger, et al, for a county road vacating a portion of the Gribble Prairie and Scott's mill road—The proper notices having been posted, and a bond of \$100 filed conditional according to law, the board being fully advised, it is ordered that Albert Gribble, J B Nos and F Eymann be and are hereby appointed viewers to meet at the beginning of said proposed road on the 27th inst, and subscribe to a written oath of office administered by John W Meldrum, deputy county surveyor, he being appointed by the board to survey said road.

In the matter of the mileage and per diem of the county commissioners for the July term, 1900, it is ordered that they be allowed as follows:

As per instructions from the county board J U Campbell, deputy district attorney, and Attorney C D Latourrette delivered an opinion on the duties of assessor and sheriff, relative to the assessment of property as follows:

erty that has been imperfectly assessed by the assessor? "Second—is an assessment valid when the description is omitted, but where reference is made for a description to a certain book and page of the records? "As a general rule it is held that the power to tax can be exercised to the extent and in the manner allowed by law, and any officer attempting to use the power must justify his act by showing express authority granted by positive statute.

"Section 2752 (as amended by Session Law 1893, p. 6) of the Code, provides that it shall be the duty of the assessor to assess all taxable property.

"Section 2831 provides that whenever the assessor shall have omitted to assess any real or personal property liable to taxation, it shall be the duty of the sheriff, upon discovering the same, to assess it.

"It will then be readily seen that while it is primarily the duty of the assessor to assess all taxable property, yet, in case of omission, the assessment may be made by either the board of equalization or by the sheriff. It is unquestionably the duty of the assessor in the first instance to make the assessments, and to make the assessments in such a manner that they will stand the test. If he chooses to describe the property by reference to a deed he should be careful to see that the deed referred to contains a description as intended.

"While the statutes last referred to prevent assessments to be made by the board and by the sheriff, they were not intended to relieve the assessor of any labor or responsibility in the performance of his duties, but merely to prevent the escape of property from taxation when he had overlooked it.

"The statutes have been declared constitutional by one supreme court, in the case of O. & C. R. Co. vs Land Company, 25 Ore. 395, and the validity of sheriff's assessment practically settled.

"The general rule is that a description that would be sufficient in any tax proceeding, and it has been repeatedly held in various states that a deed with such a description is good. It necessarily follows, then, that an assessment describing the property by reference, being good as an assessment, is good in all subsequent proceedings and should be so used by the sheriff in his delinquent list and in the notice of tax sale, without alteration or change."
