

## ABSTRACTING PROPERTY.

The City Recorder Preparing Map of Sewer District No. 2.

City Recorder Bruce C. Curry is now busily engaged in abstracting the property to be included in sewer district No. 2. It will consume about a month's time to complete the task, as a full description of every piece of property in the district, which comprises 361 lots, is necessary.

All the property between Second and Seventh streets and from Center street to and inclusive of the Eastham school, excepting that portion of the city adjacent to Falls View, will be drained by the new sewer system.

The specifications provide for the putting in sewers of terra cotta pipe of 6, 8, 10 and 12-inch inside diameter. The main sewer will run through Center street along the bluff and will be a 15-inch E. C. C. The down spout will be a 12-inch steel pipe and will descend the bluff at Seventh street and connect with the Weinhard sewer. The pipes will be laid through the middle of the streets, instead of through the alleys. Engineer Kelley is insisting that the latter would entail manifold the expense on account of the solid rock to be encountered. It is urged that the placing of a sewer through the alley between Seventh and Eighth Streets would cost one-half as much as the entire sewer system under the present plan.

G. H. Dye, F. T. Griffith and C. G. Huntley have been appointed assessors to estimate the proportionate share of the cost of the sewers to be assessed to the several owners of property to be benefited thereby. While the appraisers have not yet decided upon any definite plan of equitable assessment, it is thought they will adopt the following method: Ascertain the entire cost of the sewer and divide this sum by the number of lots to be connected. This would give the cost per lot. To the lots that are quite a distance from the sewer a small per cent added and the same per cent added to the lots that are near the sewer. This would cut down somewhat the expense of the property owner who has to make long lateral connections.

The new sewer will be completed about the first of November, and the approximate cost is \$13,000.
