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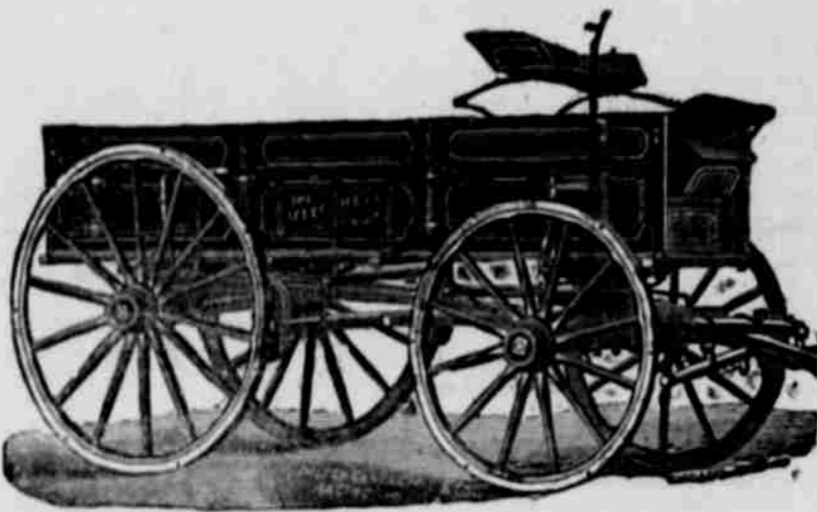

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THE WAR IN CHINA

Americans Attack the Imperial Palace in Peking.

FOUR OF THE COURTS CAPTURED

The Chinese Government Must Be Re-Established—No Small Task Confronts the Allied Forces.

LONDON, Aug. 23—4 A. M.—“Today 1500 Americans attacked the imperial palace,” says a dispatch to the Morning Post from Peking, dated August 15.

Describing the relief, the Daily Mail's correspondent cables: “August 12, the Tsung li Yamsun requested a conference, with a view to peace. No armistice was granted, however, and that night we endured the longest fusillade of the whole siege. It lasted 12 hours. August 13, the Tsung li Yamsun begged to be excused from any conference, saying that the members were too busy. Later they wrote that they had forbidden firing on us and would court martial any who disobeyed.

The Daily Chronicle publishes an interview with the Japanese minister in London, which represents him as having said:

“The empress is the heart and soul of China. As long as she lives, so long as she remains in China, whether the supreme power is taken from her or not, she will always be the greatest force, the one above all others to be reckoned with. The difficulty will be to get any one who can speak for her. I fear that the powers must come to a final understanding quickly. Riots, anarchy, bloodshed and misery throughout China will be the inevitable result of the policy that does not immediately disclose itself. The government must be re-established.”

The Japanese envoy expressed his approval of the reported American suggestion regarding a conference of the powers and said he believed that satisfactory pecuniary compensation could be secured, despite the fact that her revenues are pledged.

Field Marshal von Walderssee, according to the Daily Mail's correspondent, expresses the opinion that his labors in China will be of long duration, “as pacification will be a difficult undertaking.”

Three hundred and seventy-five thousand Russian troops are already in the far East or already on the way there by land and sea or under orders to embark. This statement is made by the Moscow correspondent of the Daily Graphic, who adds that mobilization is in progress and that there are now at Odessa 14 steamers chartered to take troops.

According to a St. Petersburg special, a telegram has been received at the Russian capital from Shanghai, announcing the departure of Li Hung Chang for Peking.

The board now convened, pursuant to adjournment, the commissioners and officers present as of yesterday.

The minutes of yesterday read and approved, and now on this day the following business was heard:

In the matter of bids for 50 cords of wood for use at the court house—This matter coming on at this time, bids were opened and examined, and it appearing that the bid of Geo Rider was the lowest, to-wit, \$2.18 per cord, therefore, it is ordered that the contract be awarded to Geo Rider, and the county clerk is authorized to draw and sign a contract in said matter for Clackamas county.

In the matter of bids for a county physician for the ensuing year—This matter coming on at this time and the bids being opened and examined by the board, and it appearing from all the bids on file the bid of Norris and Powell for the sum of \$15.75 per month being the lowest of any, therefore, it is ordered that the contract be and hereby is awarded to Norris and Powell upon their signing a contract now drawn and signed upon the part of Clackamas county by the board of county commissioners.

In the matter of the petition of A Lacy et al for road plank in district No. 33—This matter coming on upon the petition of A Lacy et al for the county to furnish plank for the main Springwater road, beginning at the south end of CH Gutztridge's lane, running north forty rods more or less, the petitioners to haul and lay down said plank upon said road, therefore, it is ordered that said petition be granted.

In the matter of the petition of Mr. Dielschneider to hold cordwood cut upon the laid out road through his land in Clackamas county—This matter coming on to be heard upon petition of Mr. Dielschneider, by his attorney, E F Riley, representing that the timber on the Rigg road laid out through Mr. Dielschneider's land has been cut into cordwood without authority by his board, or law, and the board being fully advised, it is ordered that said cordwood upon said county road through the land of Mr. Dielschneider be held until amicably settled for (continued on page 5)

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
