In the matter of the petition of D C Latourette et al for the improvement of the Jones' Mill road—This matter coming up upon the petition of D C Latourette et al for aid from the county in improving the Jones' Mill road, and it appearing to the board from the petition on file herein that the petitioners have donated the sum of \$68 for said improvement, therefore, it is ordered that the county will donate a like amount in material upon said road.

In the matter of the petition of W L Molloy et al for a county road—In the matter of the report of Robert Hughes, George Lazelle and C C Williams, viewers appointed at the last term of this board to view and locate a county road and fully described on page 168 of the court journal. Said viewers filed their report, showing that they had met on the 30th day of July, 1900, a day named in the notice served upon them, and were duly sworn by subscribing to a written oath of office, administered by John W Meldrum, deputy county surveyor, after which they proceeded to the designated place and did view and cause to be surveyed by said deputy county surveyor the road as described on page 168 of the court journal. They also filed the field notes and plat of the survey. Said viewers report favorably of the establishing of said road, for the reasons that it is a good, practical route and of public utility. Said report was read on this day on its first reading and laid over for a second reading on Saturday, Aug. 11, 1900.

The board now convened, pursuant to adjournment, the commissioners and officers present as of Thursday, the 9th inst. The minutes of that day read and approved, and now on this day the following business was had, to-wit: In the matter of the claim of Bertha Oldenberg for damages—This matter coming on to be heard upon the claim of Bertha Oldenberg for damages to her health and person caused by blasting by men employed upon the county road, and the board being fully advised, it is ordered that the claim of the said Bertha Oldenberg be and hereby is disallowed. In the matter of the petition of C G Foster, by O M Smith, for a reduction of costs and interest on taxes—This matter coming on upon the petition of C G Foster for a reduction of costs and interest on taxes for the year 1892, and the board being fully advised in the matter, it is ordered that said petition be and hereby is denied. In the matter of the petition of O S Plummer for a correction of assessment—This matter having been laid over from last month, and it now appearing that the sheriff has voluntarily made an assessment upon the property described in the petition, therefore, it is ordered that the same be and hereby is dismissed. In the matter of the petition of J K Marlay for return of money on delinquent tax sale of the property of Thomas Fitzgibbens—This matter having been laid over from the July term and coming on regularly at this time for a hearing upon the petition of J K Marlay, by H E Noble, his attorney, and the board being fully advised, it is ordered that said petition be disallowed. In the matter of the petition of Nicholas Story for a reduction of tax—This matter having been laid over from last term, and no one appearing in or for petitioner, it is ordered that said petition be laid over until the September term. In the matter of the petition of Chas O Doris for rebate of two poll taxes—This matter coming on to be heard upon petition filed herein, and it appearing therefrom that the said Chas O Doris is a non-resident and that for the year 1899 he was assessed upon the assessment rolls of the county with two poll taxes, therefore, it is ordered that the said Chas O Doris have a rebate of said tax and that a warrant be drawn in the amount of \$6. In the matter of the petition of M S Hungate et al for a county road—In the matter of the report of Levi Stehman, Phil Graves and G J Trullinger, viewers appointed at the last term of this board to view and locate a county road situated in Clackamas county, Oregon, and fully described on page 77 of the court journal, said viewers filed their report, showing that they had met on the 25th day of July, 1900, a day named in the notice served upon them, and were duly sworn by subscribing to a written oath of office administered by John W Meldrum, deputy county surveyor, after which they proceeded to the designated place and did view and cause to be surveyed by said deputy county surveyor the road as fully described on page 77 of the court journal. They also filed the field notes and plat of the survey. Said viewers report favorably to the establishment of said road as viewed and surveyed, for the reasons that it is a good, practical route and of public utility; and it appearing to the board that no remonstrance has been filed, but that a claim of damages has been filed in the sum of \$300 by H A Kaylor, it is therefore ordered that James Dickey, James Baty and Clarence Engle be appointed viewers of damages, to meet on the premises of said H A Kaylor on the 25th day of August, 1900, at 10 o'clock a. m., and after being duly sworn, that they view said road the whole distance thereof through the premises of said H A Kaylor and determine how much less valuable, if any, said lands would be rendered by reason of the location of said road, and report in writing at the next regular term of this board.
