THE LOCAL NEWS.

**CHIEF SACHEM VISITS.**—Chief Sachem Cherry, of LaGrande, paid the Tribe of Improved Order of Red Men, No. 13, of this city a fraternal visit Tuesday night. The lodge gave him a splendid welcome.

**HOME TALENT PLAY.**—The production of a home talent matinee is being arranged by several young ladies of this city. It will be kept strictly secret until the date of its occurrence is advertised.

**KINDERGARTEN SCHOOL.**—Miss Vera Canfield and Miss Anna Neffner will engage in conducting a kindergarden school during the winter months at the home of the former. The school will open Monday, September, 17.

**NEW DEPUTY TREASURER.**—The appointment of Miss Jane H. Luelling, by her father, Alfred Luelling, as Deputy County Treasurer, meets with general approval. Miss Luelling will fill the vacancy caused by the demise of the late Jacob Shadle.

**NEW CONVEYOR.**—Workmen are placing in a new conveyer to conduct wheat from the Portland Flouring Mills Company's warehouse to their mills. The old conveyer had been in use for over ten years. By means of the big auger, wheat is conducted a distance of over 600 feet under ground.

**DELINQUENT TAXES.**—The delinquent tax rolls will be published some time during October. At present they aggregate about \$13,000, which Sheriff Cooke thinks will be reduced by \$5,000 before the property is sold. Taxes can still be paid on the property contained in the delinquent list and payments are being made daily.

**DID NOT ORGANIZE.**—Last Saturday night was the date set for the organization of a democratic club in this city. Col. Robert A. Miller, the chief promoter of the club, was summoned to Jacksonville Saturday morning to attend his aged father at that place, who is lying seriously ill. On this account the meeting was postponed until next Saturday evening.

**GAVE A TREAT.**—Last Friday afternoon Mrs. G. W. Grace entertained a few friends at a tea party given at her home on Ninth street. The rooms were artistically decorated with maidenhair fern and sweet peas, while the tables were lavished with dainty refreshments. All pronounced it a social success. Those present were: Mrs. A. J. **Hop Crops Safe.**—Reports from all over the county indicate that the recent rains did no damage whatever to hop crops. Another week

of good weather will insure the safe garnering of all crops as they are free from mold and the danger of lice is past. Picking still continues energetically in the large yards, while several of the smaller fields have finished, the hops being baled and ready for market.

The highest price yet paid in Clackamas County for hops is 12½ cents per pound. This contract was made yesterday between C. L. Wolfe and L. L. Clark and H. J. Miller. The latter is to advance Messrs. Wolfe & Clark 3½ cents per pound on 6000 for picking money and to pay an additional nine cents per pound when the crop is harvested.

A chattel mortgage was placed on the hop crop of Lee Toy yesterday by John H. Woodward, for the sum of \$2500.

The Lane That Had No Turning.

Since adventuring into Egypt in quest of the raw material of which fiction is made, Mr. Gilbert Parker's Canadian fields have been lying fallow.
