

PARTNERSHIP DISSOLVED.

B. S. Bellomy Sells His Interest to Frank Busch.

There has been a change in the firm of Bellomy & Busch, house furnishers. Mr. Bellomy retires and Mr. Busch assumes control of the entire business.

This firm has been in business for the past eight years, conducting one of the largest housefurnishing establishments in the state outside of Portland.

It is Mr. Bellomy's intention to dispose of all his property in the city and move with his family somewhere in the East, after paying a visit to his parents in Kentucky.

The patrons of this firm will regret to learn of Mr. Bellomy's departure from the state.

New Cases for Divorce.

The following suits for divorce have been filed with the county clerk:

Harvey W. Gillingham asks for legal separation from Mary Gillingham, alleging desertion. Plaintiff further alleges that defendant is a non-resident of the state, and that service of summons cannot be had upon defendant within the State of Oregon.

Louisa Strauzer wants a decree of divorce from her husband, Joseph Strauzer, charging cruel and inhuman treatment. Plaintiff also asks for the care and control of three minor children. They were married in Salem in 1885.

Mamie Clark wants a divorce from Albert N. Clark on the grounds of desertion. She also asks for sole care of Frank N., Verona G. and Earl A. Clark, minor children. The couple were married at Portland in 1883.

Alma M. Hackett, of Clackamas Heights, is plaintiff in a divorce suit filed against her husband, Erwin C. Hackett, on the grounds of cruel and inhuman treatment.

Mrs. Hackett prays for an order awarding the plaintiff the custody of their minor child, Erwin Hackett, and a further order requiring defendant to pay forthwith into this court the sum of \$500 as temporary alimony to defray the plaintiff's expenses of this suit, including counsel fees, and that the defendant be required further to pay monthly the sum of \$35 for the maintenance of the plaintiff and child during the pendency of this suit; that upon final hearing the plaintiff may have a decree of divorce, that the custody of said child be awarded to plaintiff, that defendant be directed to convey to the plaintiff said land conveyed to him by Frederick and Ida M. Mundhenk, father and mother of said plaintiff, that plaintiff be awarded the undivided one-third of the real property of the defendant, consisting of lots 7 and 8 in block 5, Gladstone, valued at \$300, two lots in town of Bandon, valued at \$200, and 200 acres of the western side of donation claim of Abner Hart and wife, in Clackamas County, valued at \$400, and for her costs and disbursements herein and for such other and further relief as the court may seem meet and equitable.

C. Schaebel and C. D. Latourette are attorneys for plaintiff.

Ella Grace Hinton has filed suit for a divorce from her husband, Columbus S. Hinton. She has also filed a restraining order, whereby the defendant is prohibited from taking the children of plaintiff and defendant, Golda and Wanda Hinton, by force and without the jurisdiction of this court, and depriving plaintiff of them entirely.

For cause of divorce plaintiff alleges cruelty and non-support, and prays the court to order defendant to pay into this court \$200 for the support of plaintiff and children during its pendency, and that he be required to contribute a suitable sum per month for their support in the future.

To the Commander and Comrades of Meade Post, No. 2, G. A. R.

Your committee appointed to prepare a tribute of respect to our late comrade, Jacob Shade, respectfully submit the following:

Jacob Shade was born in Ohio in the year 1825, removing early in life to the state of Illinois. He enlisted in the war for the Union, as a private in Co. F, 58th Ill. Inf. COMMITTEE.

The first of the articles on the "Great Religions of the World", recently announced by the editor of the North American Review, appears in the September number of that periodical. The subject of the article, appropriately enough in view of the present interest in Chinese affairs, is "Confucianism in the 19th Century," and the author is Herbert A. Giles, professor of Chinese in Cambridge University, who has perhaps done more than any other writer to familiarize the minds of Western scholars with the thought and the literature of the Chinese people. Professor Giles sets forth the dominant ideas of Confucianism, shows how they affect the lives of Chinamen at the present time, and how they affect the efforts of the missionaries to Christianize the middle kingdom. Professor Giles thus summarizes the defects of Confucianism as a religion for the common people:

"With all its merits, Confucianism is seriously wanting in attractiveness to the masses, who actually know very little about it. It is a system for the philosopher in his study, not for the peasant at the plough-tail. It offers no consolation of any kind, save that to be derived from a consciousness of having done one's duty. The masses, who respect learning and authority above all things, accept Confucianism as the criterion of a perfect life. They daily perform the ceremonies of ancestral worship in all loyalty of heart, and then go off and satisfy other cravings by the practice of the rites and ceremonies of Buddhism and Taoism, which have so much more to offer by way of reward. Still, wherever Chinamen go they carry with them in their hearts the two leading features of Confucianism, the patriarchal system and ancestral worship.
