SURVIVE TEXAS TORNADO.

D. H. Pursell and Family of this City Live to Tell the Tale.

If the enormity of the awful carnage, that recently spread like a destroying angel over the great state of Texas, is not thoroughly impressed upon the mind of every citizen of this community, a brief conversation with the family of D. H. Pursell will supply the deficit. Mrs. Pursell and children arrived Wednesday night from Galveston, where they lived and suffered great loss of property during the recent visitation of devastating winds and waters in that city.

Mr. Pursell was a resident of this city until about six months ago, when he departed with his family for Galveston. There he was in the employ of his brother, one of the largest commission merchants in that city. During Mr. Pursell's residence here he held a position with the Red Front Trading company.

Mrs. Pursell states that the death list in Galveston county alone, numbered 5,000. The sights were gruesome, the suffering appalling, and the loss of property incalculable.

All their goods and chattels were swept away in the debris and they were rendered homeless. The Woodmen of the World, of which organization Mr. Pursell was a former member, procured them a railroad ticket to Oregon City. Mr. Pursell, who is still in Texas, will arrive in this city next week.

An action has been filed by John B. Cleland and W. A. Cleland against John F. Broetje for the recovery of \$628.35 with interest from the first day of March, 1893, less the sum of \$210 paid.
