TIME TO SHOOT.

When sportsmen May Burn Powder Without Fear of the Law.

The open season for bird shooting will begin October 1. Many sportsmen in this city are getting their dogs and guns in readiness preparatory for an onslaught on Mongolian pheasants, grouse and quail.

A considerable difference of opinion exists among the hunters of this vicinity as to whether or not the game warden has authority to search suspicious hunters for birds without a warrant.

"It shall be the duty of said game and forestry warden, under direction of the governor, to enforce the laws of the state of Oregon for the protection of game, song birds and forests, and for this purpose he shall visit suspected places and gather such information as may be in his power relative to infractions of such laws committed by any person.

Following is a portion of section 18 of the game and forestry laws of the state of Oregon governing the same: "It shall be the duty of said game and forestry warden, under direction of the governor, to enforce the laws of the state of Oregon for the protection of game, game birds and song birds; and if upon diligent inquiry he can discover evidence sufficient in his judgment to secure the conviction of the alleged offenders or shall have cause to believe that sufficient evidence exists to justify the same, he shall at once institute proceedings to punish the said alleged offenders.

Union Mutual Aid Society

It pays members \$15. per week for not exceeding six weeks in case of accident or sickness, and cost \$4. a year; Dr. C. S. FELL THIRTY-SIX FEET.

E. E. Seol Takes His Third Fall While Working the Painter's Brush.

E. E. Seol fell a distance of 36 feet Monday morning while engaged in painting the Congregational church. He was working on the south side of the church using a swinging ladder for the scaffold. The eaves of the building could not be reached from this staging and a small ladder was placed upright against the wall, resting on the pulley scaffold.

Dr. Seamann was immediately summoned and pronounced no bones broken, but it was thought at that time internal injuries were sustained. Later, however the attending physician announces that the patient is doing nicely and will be able to leave his room in about a week. This is the third time Seol has fallen from heights equally as lofty.
