FARMER BRYAN is now in the egg business. Someone certainly has to furnish the toughs who disturb republican meetings with stale hen fruit.

The colored men of North Carolina may be so impressed with Bryan's zeal for their race that they would vote for him if the democrats would let them.

Any party that was really in earnest about smashing the trusts would be around advocating the extension of the flag and constitution over New Jersey.

BRYAN has gathered him a posse of other men's words, and nothing but the thread that binds them is his own. "Heaven-born ratio," "consent of the governed," what Jefferson, Lincoln, et al would now say, are all borrowed. He has simply digested them.

THE Tagals have never said that they would consent to a protectorate, but Bryan has outlined one with consulting Aguinaldo. It is highly probable that the Tagals would demand, full sway. In

that event would Bryan fight or complete the surrender?

It may be true that Col. Bryan has not promised any positions in the cabinet, in the event of his election, but he may have a few places in the ice chest for some of his followers whom he thinks are not showing a proper amount of zeal.

HERE we have it. What do you think of an Oregonian, who is as tight as the bark on a young birch tree, whooping it up for Bryan, because, he claims, if he is elected he can loan his money out at from 8 to 16 per cent and will only have to pay his labor 50 cents on the dollar?

REPORTS received by the Republican State Central Committee from all parts of Oregon indicate the disappearance of two factors that were prominent in the campaign in 1896—the Silver Republicans and the Gold Democrats. The former have returned to the old party and the Gold Democrats, with few exceptions, are supporting McKinley. Neither have been swayed by Bryan by imperialism.

SELF-SEEKING politicians, timorous souls, many fall away from us, but the paramount issue—the gold standard—and the peerless candidate—William McKinley—will remain. Politicians do not make issues. The people make them, and they make something else. They make politicians, and when politicians do not do to suit them they unmake politicians and make a new set who will do to suit them. They made Bryan and he has not done to suit them, and they will unmake him next November.

THE wool and cotton reporter gives a list of twenty five large factories in the east that have closed down until after election. It says that the owners declare they will not accept credit on goods until they are sure of the result of November. If McKinley is elected they will start up immediately but if Bryan is successful the wheels of great factories will remain idle. It will be the same old story of idle men and silent mills in a short time if Bryanism gets control of the reins of government.

How much Eugene V. Debs received for causing the strike of Pennsylvania coal miners will probably remain unknown. It is a good political trick just now on the eve of a national election but he selected the wrong place to play it. Pennsylvania is too solidly republican. The coal miners will also realize sooner or later how they have been duped and will be glad to go back to work at old prices. The mine owners are not very anxious to raise wages just now anyway. It is much easier to increase the price of labor than to reduce it and it would work rather a hardship on them if Bryan would accidentally get enough votes to be elected.—Pepleton Tribune.

COLOZADO'S MOB.

While no reasonable person presumes for an instant that the disgraceful violence of the Colorado mob who sought to inflict bodily injury on Governor Roosevelt yesterday was due to democratic dictation, the fact nevertheless that the ruffians flaunted Bryan flags in the faces of the republican campaigners will scarcely serve to advance the interests of the ambitious Nebraskan. On the contrary, it may serve to recall the bitter words attributed to the Rough Rider some weeks ago to the effect that "democracy was an organization of outlaws." Although Roosevelt never delivered himself of this stupid barangue, there may be those who will take the trouble to put "two and two together" and decide that not only did the governor thus deliver himself, but that the actions of the Colorado mob fully sustain the truthfulness of the charge.

Whether or not this course of reasoning may be followed, the fact remains that no political leader or party has ever profited by the lawless acts of those who claim connection therewith. American citizenship, not to speak of American manhood, requires above all other considerations a sacred regard for the written law. It eschews the arrogation of the right by individuals or parties to interfere with civic freedom, and particularly freedom of speech, and provides for the prompt punishment of those who thus offend.

But the man who had gallantly charged the Spaniards on San Juan Hill, and who survived the famous ambush at

Las Guasimas, was evidently underestimated by the Colorado mob. He was built of sterner metal than they had anticipated, and put them to flight as easily as he and his brave Rough Rider had put terror into the hearts of the Spaniards two years before. Roosevelt knew with whom he had to deal, and measured the mob with rare accuracy when an insinuation about the "canned beef" was flung in his teeth. Looking straight into the faces of the grinning disturbers, he said: "I ate it; you never ate it; and you never were and never will be within five miles of a bullet." There was a broadside which gave the mob something to think about. Governor Roosevelt in as many words informed them that they were an aggregation of contemptible cowards, unworthy the name of American citizens.

The incident, however, bristles with possibilities. The law-abiding people of Colorado will not forget it, and thousands of those who have hitherto worshiped at the shrine of Bryan may feel from very shame that they cannot support a party or leader whose followers had blatantly insulted one of the nation's greatest heroes. It may destroy Bryan's hopes in Colorado. Many an election has been lost by incidents of less importance.

A change of forty-eight votes in this list would be necessary to elect Bryan. New York's vote alone would not suffice but New York, New Jersey and Delaware would make a winning combination, provided Bryan could hold all he got in 1896. It is manifestly absurd, however, to expect Kentucky and California, for example, to split their vote as they did in 1896. The democrats have prospects in Maryland, West Virginia, Indiana and Kentucky, to mention no other states that were carried by McKinley four years ago. On the other hand, the republicans hope to keep all the electoral votes they got in 1896 and are fighting for the votes of Idaho, Kansas, South Dakota, Utah, Washington and Wyoming. The votes of these states, together with the two that got away last time in California and Kentucky, make a total of twenty-nine. However, the loss of Maryland, West Virginia, Kentucky and even Indiana probably would not surprise the republicans very much. There loss would take forty-two votes to the democratic side. It would take, however, seven more votes to win, as compared with in 1896, since Bryan got one vote from Kentucky in that year.

Clearly New York is to be the cockpit of the present national campaign. The democrats can scarcely hope to win without it. The republicans might be able to win even if they lost New York. There is no reasonable means, by which even the most sanguine can hope to figure Mr. Bryan into the presidential chair, although he make some gains over 1896.

HINGE ON THE LAW.

Some Cases to be Weighed in the Legal Balance.

R. F. Baker has brought action against B. B. Thomas et al for the recovery of \$444.02 and interest thereon at the rate of 10 per cent per annum from the 10th day of March, 1895, less \$148 paid and for \$50 attorney fees.

The complaint alleges that E. B. Thomas and G. I. Thomas, his wife, defendants, executed their promissory note to James McNamara; that said McNamara has since died and made by will J. W. Meldrum, one of the defendants, trustee of his estate, that said Meldrum subsequently transferred to defendant, W. C. Johnson, his interest and title therefor and that W. C. Johnson subsequently transferred his interest and title for a valuable consideration to plaintiff.

That W. L. Whalley assigned and transferred his interest in said premises to R. W. Alden, David May and W. L. Molloy, as trustees of the Methodist Episcopal church, south of Oregon City and their successors in office, who agreed to pay said mortgage. C. H. Dye is attorney for plaintiff. The property is situated just above Seventh street, near Elyville.

J. H. Hawley has asked the circuit court to grant him a bill of divorce from his wife, Lina Hawley. He alleges they were married in June, 1882, in Troy, N. Y., and that five years ago she willfully abandoned him.

Hawley is the owner in fee simple in his own name of considerable valuable property in King, Clallam, Pierce, Whatcomb, Kitsop and Jefferson counties, Washington; also property in Multnomah, Lincoln and Douglas counties, Oregon; also a tract of land in Riverside City, California; also 25 acres of land in Saratoga county, New York, also three houses and lots on Sixth avenue Troy, N. Y.

Plaintiff prays for bill of divorce from defendant and that defendant be forever barred from claiming any right or title in or to the property of plaintiff. Guy G. Willis is plaintiff's attorney.

Amos J. Tucker, alleges that his wife, Sarah E. Tucker, has willfully deserted and abandoned him, and, accordingly he asks the court to grant him a bill of divorce. They were married at La Comb, Lin county, in 1896, but have not lived together since February, 1897. V. R. Hyde & Livy Stipp are attorneys for the plaintiff.
