The water commission has made repeated efforts to bring a suitable and sufficient supply of water to the city by the gravity system, with this appropriation, but so far their efforts have been unsuccessful, as the find seems to be insufficient for the purpose. The plan of bringing water from the Clackamas river is a last resort.

The present water supply is obtained from the Willamette river. It contains all manner of filth, and it is not fit to drink. Some people claim that it is even too dirty to wash in.

KEEP OFF THE GRASS.

Game Warden and Prosecuting Attorney Accused of Trespass.

"I will prosecute the first person found trespassing upon my premises, although it be the president of the United States."

These words fell from the lips of Capt. J. T. Apperson, of Parkplace, and they were not hollow, empty words.

In less than 24 hours he was putting into execution his threats, and although he was not prosecuting President McKinley he was filing a complaint against two of his staunch supporters—J. U. Campbell and Deputy Game Warden Harry S. Moody.

Warrants for their arrest were placed in the hands of Chief of Police Burns but were subsequently withdrawn by Justice McAnulty. The warrants will not be served until a statement is received from State Game Warden Quimby whom Moody claims instructed him to visit this portion of the county and arrest violators of the game law.

The circumstances of the case as related by Messrs. Moody and Campbell, are to the effect that Game Warden Quimby had heard of numerous violations of the game law where more than the lawful number of birds were being killed by sportsmen. He had instructed Deputy Moody to visit this locality and enforce the law.

In order to throw off suspicion and to make it appear as if he were in quest of birds, Moody took his gun and dog along and repaired to the fields, accompanied by Mr. Campbell.

In the course of their travel they passed through the premises of Mrs. Clark and along Moss lake until they came to Capt. Apperson's field. There they saw Floyd Jones plowing and crossed the fence and went over to ascertain whether or not hunting was permissible upon the grounds. After engaging in friendly conversation, they were informed that trespass notices were posted, and they departed out of the field and came back up the railroad track to Oregon City. They did not fire a shot during their trip.

Separate complaints were made out, charging each of them with committing trespass upon the enclosed grounds, with a gun, without the consent of the owner.

When Capt. Apperson learned that Campbell had no gun, he had no disposition to prosecute him. He also stated that if Game Warden Quimby asserts that Moody had a right upon his grounds, he will drop the case against him.
