Report of President of the Humane Society.

Great reforms move slowly forward, especially those which deal with the cruel side of human nature, therefore we must not pause in the work.—W. T. Shanahan.

Friends and Fellow-members: I have the pleasure of reporting an interesting year in all branches of the work of the Clackamas County Humane Society, which reaches this evening its second annual meeting.

The purpose of the society is to promote humanity and kindness and prevent cruelty to helpless children and dumb animals; but, like everything else new, it has to contend with the prejudices of some very good people. However, public sentiment indorses the action of our society, so that it advances surely, though slowly.

The society notes with pleasure that, chiefly owing to its efforts and representations, there has been less killing and destroying of song birds in our community for many months. Stray cats and dogs are not so ill treated, horses left to stand in the cold and storm without blankets is more infrequent and cases of open cruelty are becoming scarce.

Every complaint made to the officers of the society is carefully investigated. It is not the object of the society to arrest all persons who ill treat animals, for much of it is done not maliciously, but thoughtlessly. Experience has taught us that kindness to the man often brings kindness to the animal, and, therefore, only in cases where the brutality is wilful and malicious do we need to enforce the penalty of the law.

Our annual reward of prizes this year to pupils of the public schools for meritorious essays in behalf of dumb animals and humane principles proved highly successful. Much credit is due the principals and teachers of our schools for the interest they have taken in the work of the society and in their efforts toward inculcating the principles of humane education among the children under their care.

In January, Mr. D. T. Thompson, President of the Humane Society of Portland, gave a lecture on Japan for the benefit of the Clackamas County Humane Society. Our thanks are due and cordially extended to Mr. Thompson for his kind efforts in our behalf. We are also under obligations to the press of our city. Through its columns the work of the society is made widely known, and we are thereby enabled to keep in touch with patrons and friends.

In conclusion, let me say that the work of the society is much hampered for want of funds. We feel compelled to ask of the benevolent men and women of Oregon City their assistance, both by money and influence. Membership in this society costs 50 cents a year, and at this cost every family can have at least one membership in the Clackamas County Humane Society. In the public schools there is no other organization that is doing so much for humane education. It may not be difficult to teach children that they have duties of kindness toward dumb animals, but very many children would be slow in making this discovery without some kind of teaching.

Hiram Straight Dead.

Hiram Straight, pioneer of '48 and ex-mayor of Oregon City, died at the home of his sister, Mrs. Julia A. Frost, in Canemah, Tuesday afternoon. His death is attributed to Bright's disease.

Deceased was born in Clackamas county, his father, Hiram Straight, Sr., having come to this state in 1843. Mr. Straight was at different times actively engaged in the mercantile business in this city and was twice elected mayor, and in 1876 he represented this county in the state legislature. He was a charter member and the first vice-president of McLaughlin cabin, Sons of Oregon, and declined the position of president of the cabin last November. He was married in 1863, and a widow and six children survive him. The children are William, Hiram E., James and John, of Oregon City; Mrs. Maggie Paustian, of Montana, and Jacob G., of Manila.
