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REPUBLICANS WIN

McKinley and Roosevelt Sweep the United States.

THE COUNTRY FOR EXPANSION

McKinley 292, Bryan 155 Electoral Votes—Both Branches of Congress Safely Republican.

New York, Nov. 8.—The following telegram was sent tonight: "W. J. Bryan, Lincoln, Neb.: As you no doubt already know, the state has gone heavily against us; but whereas, this county in 1896 gave McKinley 23,000 majority it gives you today 33,000, a gain of 10,000. We are defeated, but not discouraged. RICHARD CROKER."

Hanna Not Surprised.
 CLEVELAND, O., Nov. 8.—Senator Hanna received returns at the Union club tonight. In response to a question as to the cause of McKinley's re-election, he said: "People re-elected him because they wanted him. Americanism did it." Senator Hanna said he was not surprised at the result.

Roosevelt Informed of the Result.
 CHICAGO, Nov. 7.—Vice-Chairman Payne early this morning sent the following telegram to Governor Roosevelt: "Country is saved. We have beaten Pettigrew, and captured Nebraska, Legislature and all."
 CHICAGO, Nov. 6.—Prohibition National Chairman Oliver W. Stewart said tonight: "The outcome of the election is no surprise, nor is it a disappointment. The election of McKinley will tend to focalize the sentiment of the people on the saloon question. He is committed to the canteen policy and liquor interests in our foreign possessions, and his election will have the effect of bringing the liquor question to an issue."

The Next Senate.
 WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—The next senate, assuming that the state legislatures will fulfill their duty and choose senators to represent their states, will stand on a basis of yesterday's election, as follows: Forty-nine republicans, twenty-seven democrats, and nine independents, with the legislatures in doubt in three states with the privilege of electing five senators at this time. The legislatures in doubt are Delaware and Nebraska, in each of these states two senators are to be chosen, and Idaho has one senatorial chair to fill.
