PORTLAND, Nov. 7.—The nearly complete vote of Oregon puts McKinley, 40,527; Bryan, 28,180; Woolley, 1247; Barker, 128; Debs, 854. McKinley's plurality, 12,347. Estimating unreported precincts gives McKinley a plurality of 14,225.

SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 7.—Nearly complete returns from three-fourths of the counties of the state, and estimates from the remainder, indicate that McKinley will carry the state by about 10,000.

The democrats concede that McKinley has carried the state. The democrats are positive that Governor Rogers, fusionist, has been elected by from 500 to 1000 votes.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 7.—The majority for McKinley and Roosevelt in California continues to grow, and the indications are that it will reach 40,000. The republicans have elected all seven con-

gressmen. The legislature is republican by a majority of 36. McKinley's majority in San Francisco is 9061.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Nov. 8.—At 1:30 a. m., with the returns from all but 62 out of 1884 precincts in Kentucky, the Courier-Journal puts Bryan's majority at 7784 and Beckham's at 4608.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Nov. 7.—The Courier-Journal, with returns from 1700 out of 1884 precincts in Kentucky, puts Bryan's majority at 8000 and Beckham's (democrat), for governor, at 4533.

OMAHA, Neb., Nov. 7.—The election returns in Nebraska are so close as to be watched keenly. Chairman Lindsey, of the republicans, claims tonight that McKinley carries that state by 7000 or more; that the republican state ticket wins by 8000 to 7000, and that the republicans have a majority of the seven-
