AGREE ON PROTOCOL

Envoys at Peking Decide on Peace Terms.

BYRAN AN EDITOR-IN-CHIEF.

The Off-Defeated Candidate to Work for W. R. Hearst on a Salary of \$25,000 Per Year.

LONDON, Nov. 15.—Dr. Morrison, writing to the Times from Peking, Sunday, says:

"Pressed by the common desire for a speedy termination of present conditions, the foreign envoys have finally agreed to the following terms to be presented in a joint note, which subject to the approval of the government, will be pressed upon China as the basis of a preliminary treaty:

"China shall erect a monument to Baron von Ketteler on the site where he was murdered and send an Imperial prince to Germany to convey an apology. "She shall inflict the death penalty upon 11 princes and officials already named and suspend provincial examinations for five years where the outrages occurred.

"In future, all officials failing to prevent anti-foreign outrages within their jurisdiction shall be dismissed and punished. (This is a modification of Mr. Conger's proposal.)

"Indemnity shall be paid to the states, corporations and individuals.

"The Tsung Li Yamun shall be abolished and its functions vested in a foreign minister.

"Rational intercourse shall be permitted with the emperor, as in civilized countries.

"The forts at Taku and other forts on the coast of Chi Li shall be razed, and the importations of arms and war material prohibited.

"Permanent legation guards shall be maintained, and also guards of communication between Peking and the sea.

"Imperial proclamations shall be posted for two years throughout the empire, suppressing the Boxers.

"The indemnity is to include compensation for Chinese who suffered through being employed by foreigners, but not compensation for native Christians. The words, 'missionary' do not occur in the note."

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10.—W. R. Hearst, proprietor of the San Francisco Examiner, New York Journal and Chicago American, it is said, on good authority, today, is to begin the publication of a daily paper in the National Capital within the next month. His editor-in-chief will be no less a person than William Jennings Bryan. Bryan's salary, it is said, will be \$25,000 a year.

DENVER, Colo., Nov. 10.—Colonel W. J. Bryan has declined an offer of an editorial position on a Denver afternoon newspaper at a salary of \$10,000 a year. In his reply, which was telegraphed from Lincoln, Neb., today, he says: "I shall remain here, and in the future as in the past, defend with tongue and pen the principles which I believe to be right and politics I believe to be wise."

NEBRASKA FOR MCKINLEY.
 His Plurality Will Be About 7000—Governorship in Doubt.

OMAHA, Nov. 9.—Practically complete returns for the Electoral ticket and on Governor show that McKinley carried Nebraska by about 7000, and that the Governorship is but a few votes either way and will require the official returns to decide the result. It is claimed by both sides that the plurality will be but 100 or 200, whichever way it may go. The state ticket will be decided, the fusionists getting the lieutenant-governor, attorney-general and land commissioner, and the republicans the auditor, treasurer and superintendent of instruction.

The present representation in congress will remain undisturbed. Stark, fus, is elected in the 4th district, by 549; Robinson, fus, in the third by about 200; Neville, fus, in the sixth by 300, and Shallenger in the fifth by 1500. Burkett, rep, wins in the first by 2600, and Mercer, rep, in the second by 1300. The legislature, the returns on which are not yet complete, will probably stand: senate, republicans, 16; Fusionists, 16; vacant, 1. House, republicans, 51; fusionists, 49.

CLEVELAND, O., Nov. 12.—Senator Hanna has returned here after a brief visit to New York. He expects to remain in this city until congress convenes. In discussing the coming session, Mr. Hanna said:

"Congress this year will have some very important duties to perform. Three great bills, the Nicaragua Canal bill, the Army bill and the Ship Subsidy bill, are all to come before it. The Nicaragua commission will make its report early in the session and the debate in the senate will probably begin early.

"I presume there will be changes of some importance in the bill. It is reasonable to suppose that a lapse of several months has made a difference in the sentiment of the people on the bill,

and a change in some of its main features will be the natural result. The Costa Rican treaty, especially, involved us in considerable difficulty, and the Costa Rican government had to be consulted."

When asked with what measures he would most interest himself during the session, he replied:

"The Ship Subsidy bill appeals to me."
