BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS.

asks the court that said warrant be cancelled, therefore it is ordered that said warrant be cancelled and held for naught.

In the matter of the building of the Butte Creek bridge. This matter coming on to be heard at this time, and it appearing that said bridge having been completed and accepted, also the pile driving at the Kellin bridge, it is ordered that a warrant to be drawn in favor of R. L. Morris for the same in the sum of \$220.

In the matter of tax certificate No. 577 for the year 1897, this matter coming on to be heard, and it appearing to the board that on Oct. 2, 1898, Clackamas county bid in the property of Russell & Smith at delinquent tax sale, and therefor tax certificate No. 567, and that thereafter on the 8th day of September, 1899, assigned said certificate No. 567 to one F. F. Johnson, and on the 11th day of May, 1900, Russell & Smith redeemed the said property covered by said certificate No. 567, paying therefor the sum of \$5.78 and through a mistake of the county clerk said amount was paid into the county treasurer on the 12th day of May, 1900, and receipt No. 567 received therefor. It is therefore ordered that the county treasurer return said amount of \$5.78 to the county clerk to be turned over to the said F. F. Johnson by said county clerk.

In the matter of the petition of Isabella Palmer in regard to tax sales and assessments. This matter coming on to be heard on petition of Isabella Palmer, and it appearing to the board that the property as set out in the petition on file herein has been doubly assessed and become delinquent, advertised and sold for the years 1897 and 1898; also that petitioner paid the 1899 tax amounting to \$1.42, and the board being fully advised in the matter, it is ordered that the county clerk cancel the claims of the county against the said property described in the said petition for the years 1898, 1899, 1900 and 1899 and 1899. It is also further ordered that a warrant be drawn in the amount of \$1.42 in favor of Isabella Palmer as a rebate of \$1899 tax.

In the matter of an index to the assessment roll for the year 1900. This matter coming on to be heard upon the bids filed herein for the making of a type written index to the 1900 assessment roll, and the board being fully advised, it is ordered that the contract for the making of said index be let to K. H. Gabbert upon the bid of \$18 for the sum of \$0.16.

In the matter of double assessment on the property of L. G. Carlson. This matter coming up on a written petition filed herein, and it appearing to the board from said petition that there has been a double assessment against said L. G. Carlson's land, and it is ordered that said L. G. Carlson have a rebate of \$4.58, and that the clerk draw a warrant for said amount.

In the matter of the application of J. J. Kimball for a road. This matter coming up on the petition of J. J. Kimball, et al, for a road, it is ordered that the appointment of viewers to view said road, be postponed until the December term of court.

In the matter of the double assessment of realty of Byron Wakefield. This matter coming up on the written petition of

Byron Wakefield, and it appearing to the board that Byron Wakefield is doubly assessed for the year 1899, he having paid thereon the sum of \$1.40; it is ordered by the board that Byron Wakefield have a rebate of \$1.40, and that the clerk draw a warrant for said amount.

In the matter of a poll tax assessed to George Clark, Jr., a non-resident. A written petition being on file, and it appearing to the board therefrom that George Clark, Jr., is entitled to a rebate of \$3, poll tax, it is ordered that the clerk draw a warrant to said George Clark for said amount.

In the matter of insurance policies. This matter coming on, and it appearing to the board that \$7500 insurance on the court house, fixtures and stationery and records has expired, and the board being fully advised, it is ordered that insurance be renewed in the sum of \$10,000 as follows: Atlas of London, \$2500; Glen's Falls, N. Y., \$2500; Actua of Hartford, \$2500; the Lion of London, \$2500.

In the matter of the per diem and mileage of commissioners, it is ordered by the board the mileage and per diem of the commissioners be allowed as follows:

In the matter of the bond of E. P. Randa, as county surveyor. Now comes E. P. Randa, the duly elected county surveyor, (having been elected at the June election for said county and state on the 4th day of June, 1900) and files his bond for the faithful discharge of his office as county surveyor. And the board being fully advised, it is ordered that said bond be approved.

In the matter of the petition of O. C. Blaney, et al, for the improvement of the Oregon City and Cutting's mill road. The matter coming on the petition of O. C. In the matter of the assignment of tax sales certificates by the county. It is ordered that no assignment of certificates of tax sales be made without further orders of the board.

In the matter of the petition of J. S. Albel for rebate of poll tax. This matter coming on the petitioner, J. S. Albel-1 having his written petition herein with tax receipt and poll tax receipt attached thereto for the year 1899, and it appearing to the board that J. S. Albel is over 50 years, it is ordered that the said J. S. Albel have a rebate of \$3 upon said tax.

In the matter of the petition of John Graham for rebate of tax. This matter coming up on the written petition of John Graham, and the board being fully advised, it is ordered that a rebate of \$5.62 be allowed as set out in said petition, and that a warrant be issued therefor.

In the matter of the petition of E. H. Cooper for a rebate of \$5 over-paid into the treasury. This matter coming on, and it appearing to the board that E. H. Cooper, county clerk, collected and turned into the treasury on September 28, 1900, a fee of \$5 from Attorney C. D. and D. C. Latonrette, which was wrongfully collected, and had to be returned to the said C. D. and D. C. Latonrette, which said E. H. Cooper, county clerk, paid, therefore it is ordered that said E. H. Cooper be reimbursed in said amount and that a warrant be drawn in his name for \$5.

In the matter of the petition of H. E. Noble, a petitioner for rebate on double assessment. This matter coming on to board, and a showing made that 10 acres had been doubly assessed and sold under certificate to P. H. Marley. It is ordered therefore, that said certificate be cancelled and P. H. Marley be allowed \$5.46, the amount so paid by him or his agents, and that a warrant issue for same.

In the matter of W. L. Linsley, a county charge. This matter coming on and it appearing that no warrant was issued for W. L. Linsley for the month of October, it is now ordered that no more warrants be issued in favor of the said W. L. Linsley.

In the matter of the claim of Fred Wagner, supervisor of road district No. 35, it appearing to the board that at the regular session of the board Fred Wagner filed his road report, but failed to report his own time thereon. It is now ordered that his time amounting to \$12 be allowed, and a warrant be issued for the same.

In the matter of the claim of J. R. Myers, supervisor of road district No. 14, it appearing to the board that at the regular session of the board J. R. Myers filed his road report, but failed to report his own time thereon. It is now ordered that his time amounting to \$8 be allowed and a warrant issue for the same.

In the matter of the road report of A. W. Cooke, supervisor of district No. 3, it appearing to the board that warrants numbered 14, 669, 14670, 14671, 14672 and 14673 were erroneously drawn in the report of A. W. Cooke, road supervisor for district No. 3, filed herein on the day of November, 1900, and recorded on page 252 of this journal, therefore it is ordered that said warrants so numbered be and they are hereby cancelled and held for naught.
