WASHINGTON, Dec 18.—Argument in the Porto Rican-Philippines cases, involving the status of those countries to the United States, was resumed in the Supreme court today. The widespread interest in the cases was shown by the large attendance of prominent members of the bar and by a crowd of spectators which filled the public area and overflowed in the corridor. Senators and representatives in congress dropped in as the arguments proceeded and gave attentive ear to the proceedings.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18.—A message from United States Consul Gummeri, at Tangier, informs the state department that the Moorish Government had settled the claim of the United States for \$500 indemnity on account of the murder of Marcus Eszagi, a naturalized American citizen, in Morocco last Spring.

Ex-President Cleveland in a contribution to the Saturday evening Post uses the following language in discussing the future democracy:

"The culmination of democratic woe was reached when its compact with these un-democratic forces was complete, and when our rank and file were summoned to do battle under banners which bore strange symbols and which were held aloft in unfamiliar hands. The result of such a betrayal was foredoomed. This abandonment of the principles of the true democracy, this contemptuous disobedience of the traditions, and this deliberate violation of the law of its strength and vigor, were by a degree as inexorable as that of fate followed by the inevitable punishment of stunning, staggering defeat.

"The disaster of 1872, invited by a similar made venture, was quickly followed by a return to the professions and practices of sane democracy. But the extent and perseverance of our wanderings in 1896 is illustrated in a most astounding way by the command issued on the day of our rout and discomfiture, that a second battle should be fought on the same field, with the same false warcries and from the same leadership that had brought us to the gleam of defeat.

"Thus in 1900 the lesson of 1896 was contemptuously rejected and every hope of democratic success was willfully cast aside. Again our long-suffering rank and file, whose loyalty and obedience deserved better things, were sacrificed in a cause theirs only in name, and it was demonstrated, but more clearly than ever before, that the only forces that can win democratic success are adherence to recognized democratic principles and reliance upon democratic councils and leadership.

Turkey Will Not Pay.

New York, Dec. 18.—A special to the Herald from Washington says: Payment of the missionary claims pending against Turkey is no longer expected by the Administration. Although the Sultan entertained the officers of the Kentucky in truly royal style, he did not let the presence of the battle-ship have any effect upon his pocket-book, and still holds the \$90,000 which American missionaries assert is the value of personal and missionary property destroyed six years ago. The belief of the Administration is that Turkey will not settle the claims arising out of the reported purpose of Great Britain to press the missionary claims of her subjects against the Sublime Porte. It is stated that if another nation begins to press its claims, the Sultan will probably decline to settle those of the United States.
