CITY COUNCIL.

At Meeting of Oregon City Fathers in the New Century. The Oregon City council met in regular session Wednesday evening. His Honor, Mayor Dimick presided. All members were present. The following business was transacted: Petitions asking for lights at 12th and Taylor, and 15th and Madison streets were read, and referred to the committee afterwards appointed. Two petitions, asking for rebates on sewer assessment, were read and referred to the committee. A petition asking that the alley in block 64 be opened, was read and referred to committee. The election of a recorder followed. Bruce C. Curry and John Loder were candidates. Curry received seven votes; Loder, two. Curry elected. The mayor's inaugural address was read, and on motion, was placed on file. Annual reports of recorder and treasurer were read and referred to finance committee. Councilman Koerner moved that a committee, to be composed of the chairmen of the several council committees, be appointed, to take up the matter of amending the charter so as to limit the city's expenditures to a sum not greater than the receipts; also to take up other matters regarding the charter, that would benefit the city's welfare. Carried. The mayor announced that the adoption of the amendments proposed by Mr. Albright, was the question before the council. Put and lost. Question, shall the ordinance pass? Put and lost by vote of 7 to 2. Water commissioner's report read and ordered published. Ordinance regarding connections with the city sewers by outside parties, was read second time and passed. An ordinance levying a special tax of one-tenth of the amount of the bonds issued under the Bancroft act referred to parties who applied to pay their assessment under said act. Mayor appointed following officers; all confirmed: Chief of police, Chas. E. Burns; night-watch, E. L. Shaw; superintendent of streets, J. Green; city engineer, Ernest Rands. Recorder was instructed to invite proposals from the city papers for city printing for ensuing year. Following committees were appointed: Finance, R. Koerner, C. G. Huntly and William Shehan; streets and public property, Charles Albright, E. F. Storey and E. W. Scott; fire and water, C. G. Huntly, S. D. Francis and Bruce Zim-wolt, William Shehan; cemetery, E. F. Storey, E. W. Scott, S. D. Francis. Moved that bonding ordinance in regard to sale of bonds, came up for final reading January 11. Council adjourned to meet January 11, 1901. Married. On New Year's day a very pretty wedding was celebrated at the home of Thomas Blanchard, sr. when the only daughter, Miss Clara, was united in marriage with Leslie Holmes, a prominent business man of Canby. A number of relatives and friends were present. At 12 o'clock, as the wedding march was played by Miss Randal, the happy couple took their place under an arch of ivy and snowdrops. Miss Eva Todd and James Blanchard acted as attendants. Rev. Dunlap, of Canby, pronounced the impressive ring ceremony and after congratulations and best wishes, the guests, led by the newly wedded pair, repaired to the dining room where a bounteous feast was spread.
