CUBA AND THE UNITED STATES.

If the Cuban constitutional convention now assembled in Havana should adopt certain plans for future relations with the United States now under discussion this country would have no cause to accuse the island republic of ingratitude for past favors. The plan affirms an acceptance of the Monroe doctrine, the establishment of friendly relations with all nations and a resolution to regulate its foreign policy in accord with the wishes of the United States. It proposes to put at the disposal of the United States a portion of any bay on the north coast, and of two bays on the south coast for naval stations, together with concessions sufficient in extent for the purposes of defense and sanitation. Finally it declares that Cuba will place itself on a war footing to help the United States, in case such assistance should be needed.

This plan accepts the ultimate authority of the United States in foreign affairs, thus eliminating the peril of an embroilment between the island and some power which might threaten to draw this country into controversies. As much liberty is conceded as would be desired if the island belonged to this country instead of to the Cubans. One naval station on the north coast and two on the south coast would be ample for all possible demands.

Least of all is the promise to place Cuba on a war footing when needed to help the United States to be dismissed as inconsequential. This does not suggest that the Cuban army or the Cuban navy may some time prove allies of strength to an American force, but that the technical status of alliance would be accepted. That would place all the harbors of the island available for operations, refuge, supply and communication. We have cause to know that to enter such a harbor as that of Santiago, behind even such obsolete fortifications as those of Morro castle, brings safety to a fleeing squadron.

The Cuban constitutional convention is showing a disposition distinctly creditable to itself and to be welcomed by Americans. To some extent the action is taken under duress, but there is no reason to suggest bad faith in it. The call for the convention virtually commanded the Cubans to bid for their freedom as liberally as possible by instructing them to define their relations to the United States in adopting a constitution which would have to pass approval in the United States before freedom was given them. The bid they are planning to make seems a generous one and probably will be so recognized by the United States.—Chicago Record.

ORDINANCE NO. --

An Ordinance making a levy of a special tax equal to the annual installment and unpaid balances upon certain property assessed for the cost of the improvement of certain streets and laying of certain sewers, the owners of which have made application to pay their assessments by installments, as provided by an act of the Legislature of the State of Oregon, entitled "An Act to Provide for the Issuance of Bonds for the Improvement of Streets and Laying of Sewers in Incorporated Cities and for the Payment of the Cost of such Improvement of Streets and Laying of Sewers by Installments."

Oregon City does ordain as follows:

Section 1. That whereas certain persons, owners of property situate within the corporate limits of Oregon City, have been assessed for the cost of the improvement of certain streets and for the laying of certain sewers, pursuant to ordinances duly passed by the City Council of Oregon City, and said owners of property aforesaid have made and filed with the Recorder of said Oregon City their written application to pay their several assessments by installments, pursuant to the provisions of an act of the Legislature of the State of Oregon, entitled "An Act to Provide for the Issuance of Bonds for the Improvement of Streets and Laying of Sewers in Incorporated Cities and for the Payment of the Cost of such Improvement of Streets and Laying of Sewers by Installments"; and, whereas, in conformity to said law and because of said written applications, Oregon City has issued its bonds equal to the aggregate sum of said assessments;

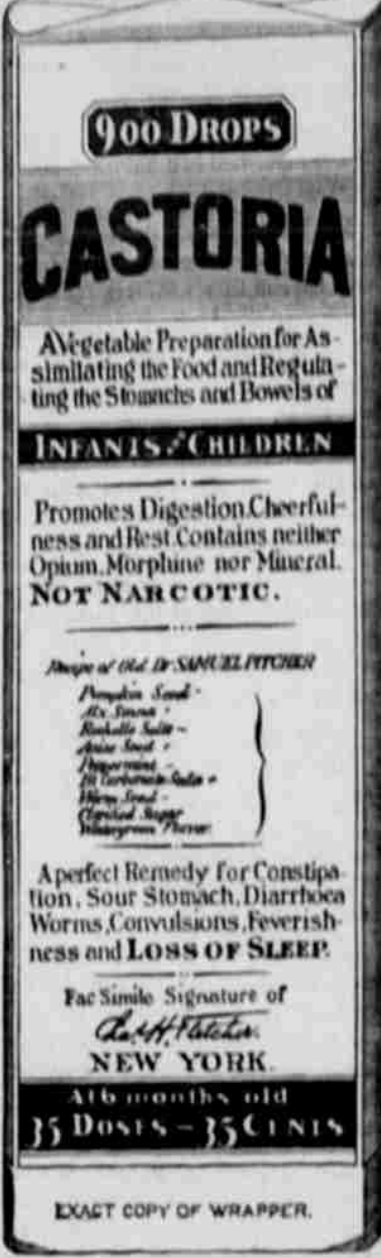
Now, therefore, pursuant to law, Oregon City does hereby levy a special tax upon each lot and parcel of land assessed as aforesaid, the owners of which have made application to pay such assessments by installments, to-wit: The sum set opposite each lot or parcel of land (the same being equal to 10 per cent of said bonds heretofore issued) particularly described and set out as follows:
