County School Superintendent Zinner, has completed the January apportionment of the county school fund. It gives each district \$9.

Since the water has submerged the roads and walks to Clackamas Heights, people have been passing to and fro between there and the city by means of boats.

A big raft of logs containing about 1,000,000 feet of lumber, broke loose at Rock Island yesterday and floated off down the river. It has not yet been recovered.

Ducks are said to be plentiful at the mouth of the Molalla. W. M. Shank, the 7th street undertaker went out there Tuesday evening and bagged eight in a short time.

Several families in the Clackamas bottoms have been compelled to move out of their homes on account of the water. One family is living high and dry in a tent.

Nine thousand cords of wood was rickied up on the bank at Buckman's landing, and the high water cut under it and let a large quantity into the river, which is all lost.

The ladies furnished the baskets and the gentlemen drew them by lot, paying two cents per pound for each pound that the owner weighed in excess of 100 pounds.

It is reported that he will take a newspaper outfit back with him and that W. C. Campbell, of this city will join him in the publication of a paper at Cook's Inlet.

The annual report of the Oregon division G. A. R. is just completed. It shows that there are 60 prosperous posts of civil war veterans in the state, the greatest increase the past year being made at Oregon City. All posts are in better financial condition than they were last year. The aggregate membership is about 1800.—Yamhill County Reporter.

SPECIAL COUNCIL MEETING.

Two City Ordinances Were Passed Last Friday Night.

The city council of Oregon City held a special meeting last Friday night, at which two ordinances were passed, one of which provides for levying a 7-mill tax on all property for 1900. The other ordinance authorizes the mayor and recorder to execute and deliver to the Bank of Oregon City the bonds purchased by that bank.

A petition for a light on Sixth and Main streets was read and referred to the committee on streets and public property.

The mayor was instructed to call a special meeting for Friday, January 18, to consider the sewer proposition.

The committee on streets and public property reported favorably upon removing the arc light from Ross street to Fifteenth and Madison streets. Report was adopted and committee ordered to make the change. This committee also reported favorably upon the Cross petition, asking for the opening of the alley in block 64. This matter was laid over to the next regular meeting of the council.

The street committee was instructed to notify persons who own property on the north side of Eleventh street from Monroe to Adams, and on the south side of Eleventh street from Adams to Jackson to build sidewalks.

Councilman Albright was elected president of the council.

Next Monday evening at the Congregational church, T. A. Boyer will deliver the first lecture of a course that has been arranged by the public school of Oregon City. The course will include six lectures and two concerts. The subject of Mr. Boyer's lecture is "Crossing the Century Line."
