THE LOCAL NEWS.

STRICKEN WITH PARALYSIS.—Word reached this city Monday that Mrs. J. C. Walgamot, living at Canby, had been stricken with paralysis.

BOUGHT THE CLIFF HOUSE.—C. W. Bagley, who owns and operates a saw mill at Louisville, Wash., has bought the furniture and leased the Cliff House, in this city, from Jacob Cassel.

REVOKED A FRANCHISE. The Board of County Commissioners Make an Order.

There may be an electric road built from this city south to Canemah, and then again there may not. Whether the road is ever made or not, cannot be definitely foretold, but one thing is certain; the county is going to have a peck or so of trouble on its hands.

Early in January this year, the county board granted a perpetual franchise to an organization known as the Oregon City and Southern Railway Company, to build and operate an electric railroad from Oregon City south through the county to Canemah, a distance of about a mile.

Last Monday the board of commissioners made an order revoking the franchise. The order was made at the instigation of the Southern Pacific Co., the Oregon & California Railroad Co., C. W. Ganong, et al, on the ground that it interfered with the franchise of the Southern Pacific Co., and destroyed the utility of the county road for teamsters and pedestrians.

In rescinding the order the board held that "the said order granting the franchise was entered by mistake and the said order as entered does not confirm to the intention now understood of the court at the time said franchise was granted, and said order entered, in the extent and manner of using said parts of the county roads and streets granted in said franchise."

The Oregon City & Southern Railway Co., will take an appeal from this order and there is every probability that the county will have quite a little mess of trouble over the matter, as the company also talks of bringing suit against the county for damages.

The attorneys for the Oregon City & Southern Co., were C. D. and D. C. Latourette; Attorney G. E. Hayes was specially employed by the S. P. & O. C. companies.

Death of Mr. Thomas Pusey. The body of the late Thomas Pusey, who died early Thursday morning, January 24, at the home of his daughter, Mrs. W. P. Hawley, in Oakland, Cal., was conveyed to Stockton for interment in Rural cemetery.

Mr. Pusey was a native of England, being born in Richmond, Yorkshire, January 7, 1837. The deceased was a resident of Stockton for many years, being formerly engaged in the manufacture of paper in Michigan, afterwards moving to Oregon, remaining there a few years, returning to California a few months ago.
