Geo. W. Lee Dead.

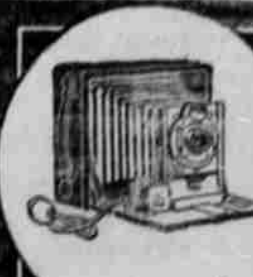
George W. Lee, a well known and much respected citizen of the Clark's neighborhood, died at his home Wednesday, February 6, aged 65 years.
