

City Council.

Oregon City Council met last Wednesday evening at 7:30. Mayor and all members were present. The following proceedings were had:

Petition for sidewalk by Ivy Straight was read and referred to committee on streets and public property.

Mitchell & Hard, cont actors were allowed \$2500, on sewer contract.

J. H. Cunningham, consulting engineer, submitted his report on the Chairman. This plan is for a road 20 feet wide from lower Third street, up over the bluff to Highstreet. Cunningham's report was in detail and accompanied with elaborate drawings and plans, and shows that the road can be constructed at a total cost of \$18544.36

On motion, bids for printing were laid over till next meeting.

Mr. Koerner made a verbal report to charter amendment.

Moved that mayor call mass meeting for Friday night, February 8, to consider matters pertaining to sewers, etc.

Streets committee asked and were granted further time to report in regard to lights

Woodard asked leave to erect a sign board on road up the hill. Referred to committee on streets and public property.

Moved that Weinhard culvert matter be referred to foreman of committee to report at next meeting.

Moved by Albright and seconded by Koerner, that the Portland City & Oregon Railway Co., be notified to discontinue handling of freight cars on Main street, in Oregon City, and cited Ordinance No. 201, page 215, Ordinances of Oregon City. Mayor instructed recorder to notify said company to discontinue all except one express car, on said street, after noon on Monday, February 11. Mayor instructed Chief of Police to arrest any person running or using any freight car or cars, except one express car on Main street, in Oregon City, after noon on Monday, February 11.

Moved that Ed Shaw be allowed \$30 for injuries received while performing marshal duty. Recorder ordered to draw warrant for the amount.

Ordered that Wilson ordinance be published.

Sever ordinance passed.

Committee on S & P. P. instructed to look up matter pertaining to locating the city pound on city property, in order to stop the payment of rent for pound.

Pr.bate Orders.

In the matter of the estate of James King, deceased, J. W. King, administrator, made final settlement and was discharged and his bondsmen exonerated.

Court ordered that Sarah F. Shively, administratrix of the estate of Michael Shively, deceased, invest \$1000 in real estate by buying the south 1/2 of the northwest 1/4 of section 21, township 5, range 1 east, in Clackamas county.

William Sheahan, executor of the estate of Julia Ann Metcalf, deceased, made final settlement and was discharged.

G. W. Ganong et al, filed a complaint in the circuit court Wednesday against the Oregon City & Southern railroad company, asking that an injunction be issued to restrain the company from doing any work on the proposed road to Canemah.

In the meantime the company goes merrily along perfecting the track already laid, and giving every indication that it fully intends to complete the job begun last Sunday.

General Cox Quelled a Mutiny.

General Cox was a good disciplinarian, but he never blustered and was never severe. On one occasion several officers called at his headquarters and stated to him that they would not promise to march their men up the narrow river valley. He sent them to their quarters and said nothing of their impertinence until after the war.

While in camp at Gauley bridge his quartermaster general shot a private in the Second Kentucky. The men of the regiment escaped the control of the officers and made a rush to kill the quartermaster, who had been taken to Cox's headquarters. Cox saw the men coming, but instead of ordering the guards to fire on them he ran toward them alone, bareheaded and unarmed. He reached a gap in a stone wall ahead of the 500 or 600 furious armed men and stopped them. He explained that they might kill him, but they could not pass.

Straightening to his full height, he said: "Your general, unarmed, as you see, orders you to remember that you are soldiers and obey." Much to the surprise of the score of anxious officers watching the parley, the men returned to their camp. Cox sent for a company from another regiment, which guarded the prisoner to the lower camp. No charge of mutiny ever appeared against that regiment, which afterward, under Nelson and Palmer, made a splendid reputation for drill, discipline and hard fighting.—Chicago Inter Ocean.

An Acrobatic Spider.

A curious instance of the ability of an insect to successfully measure distance was evidenced once while I was traveling through northern Argentina. I first made the acquaintance of my friend on the back veranda of a little village tavern. I was lying in a hammock. About two feet from me was a 3 by 3 inch hand rail of wood, supported by wooden balusters. As I lay there I noticed a fly alight on the top of the wood. While I watched him, the fly apparently turned into a spider. I could not believe my eyes, but on closer inspection I saw that a spider jumped from somewhere and alighted on top of my fly.

I thought this worth watching and found that this was his method of procedure: A fly would alight on top of the railing, the spider would take in the distance at a glance and would disappear down the side of the rail, walk along toward the fly, but out of sight, until he reached the place on the side of the rail at right angles to the position occupied by the fly when he last saw it. Then he would walk nearly to the top of the rail and fasten his web, then walk down, paying out his web as he went till he was as far from the place where he had fastened his web as the fly, then one vigorous leap, the web swinging him round in the arc of a circle, and he would alight on top of the fly.

I have never seen one miss this seemingly difficult leap, except when the fly left his position before the spider had finished his preliminaries.—E. A. Suverkrup in Scientific American.
