News of the Week

Saturday, February 16.

Congress-There will be no vote on the ship-subsidy bill this session. The senate passed the agricultural bill. Filibustering prevented business in the house. The house committee on elections confirmed Wilcox's right to a seat.

Foreign-The British are driving Dewet back from Philipstown. It is reported at Tien Tsin that seven nations declared war against China.

Domestic-Maurice Thompson, the aufest Athletic club paid its forfeit to Brady civil service bill. and Martin promoters of the Jeffries-Rublin fight, for failing to pull off the fight.

Legislatures-Oregon house passed bill of clerks of circuit and county courts and Cavite coast. recorder. Railroads asked to present their side against reduction of rates in Washington legislature. Idaho house voted to maintain martial law in the Coeur d'Alenes. Idaho house decided not to visit Washington elegislature.

Pacific Coast-Sixty-six miners are entombed in a mine near Union, Vancouver Island, with no chance of escape. The Mann system of water ditches in Eastern Oregon has been bonded for \$60,000. Northwest representatives in congress have united on Vancouver as musteringout place for the Thir y-fifth regiment.
