COMING TO OREGON
 President McKinley Will Visit the Pacific Coast.

HIS TRIP HAS BEEN ARRANGED.
 The Presidential Party Will Pass Through the State Next Month, Stopping at Portland.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 8.—After making a number of changes in the itinerary of the presidential party's visit to the Pacific coast, Secretary Cortelyou has at last arranged a programme which he hopes will be followed. Under this schedule, the party will reach Ashland, Or., at 6:45 p. m., May 21, and leave there at 7 p. m. After making such stops as possible during the night, it will arrive in Salem at 9 a. m. next morning, and spend three hours in the capital city. Portland will be reached at 2:15 Wednesday afternoon. The entire afternoon and evening will be spent in viewing the city, according to the arrangements made by the local committee, which have not yet been communicated to Mr. Cortelyou. All speech-making and formal receptions will be avoided, and as much time spent in driving about as possible.

At 9 o'clock the next morning, the president will leave Portland, stopping first at Chehalis at 12:30, then at Centralia, reaching Olympia at 2:15 that afternoon, where an hour will be spent. Olympia was once stricken from the itinerary, but being the capital of the state, has been restored. At 4:30 Tacoma will be reached, and there the night of May 23 spent. Next morning the president will take a boat, and view the important points on Puget Sound, reaching Seattle at 2:30 in the afternoon. The party is to leave Seattle at 3 o'clock Saturday morning, and by making only short stops at the important points across the state, will reach Spokane Sunday morning at 1 o'clock. Early Monday the presidential party will start eastward from Spokane. Commissioner Herrmann today extended to the president an invitation of the people of Roseburg to stop off when passing through their town. Inasmuch as the train passes there at 2 a. m., this stop will probably have to be abandoned. It has been suggested that the people living in Southern Oregon, whose towns will be passed in the dead of night, should meet the president at Salem, where a stop of three hours will be made. So far, none of the details of the president's visit about the cities of Portland or Salem have been agreed to, but it is expected definite arrangements will be completed before he leaves Washington.

In the matter of the petition of F P Larsen, et al for a county road.
 In the matter of the petition filed by F P Larsen and more than twelve householders of the county living in the vicinity of the road described in the petition, and praying viewers to be appointed to view and locate a county road in Clackamas county, Oregon, described in full as follows: Commencing about 25 feet east of a marked tree on the Bockman road running thence about 36 rods in a northerly direction to the southwest corner of the north half of the N E 1/4 of section 32, T 2 S, R 1 E; thence due north on or near half section line about 24 rods to a stake; thence in a northwesterly direction about 37 rods to a stake marked "R" in the center of the Portland road, said petition being for a change in the Bockman road, and that part of said road supplied by the new to be vacated, said petitioner filed his affidavit of notices posted, one on the court house bulletin board, and three in three of the most public places in vicinity of proposed road, more than thirty days prior to the presentation of the petition. He also filed a bond for one hundred dollars, conditioned according to law. The board being fully advised, it is ordered that Richard Aldenstadt,
