**A QUESTION OF LAW**  
 Important Ruling by a Wisconsin Circuit Judge.

**CHRISTIAN SCIENCE SUSTAINED.**  
 Court Says That the Art of Healing Can be Carried on by Christian Scientists.

MILWAUKEE, Wis. April 18.—Judge Eugene S. Elliott, in the circuit court today, decided that Christian Scientists are not liable to prosecution under the state medical law. The court ruled that the scientists can no more be held for practicing medicine by their means of healing by prayer than can a minister who prays at the bedside of the sick and receives therefor a fee, either directly or indirectly. The case was that of the state against Crescentia Arries and Emma Nicholas, Christian Scientists, who treated a child named Grosenback, afflicted with diphtheria and who died from the disease.

Huntley be and are hereby appointed supervisors of bicycle paths in Clackamas county, and that they have control and management of paths and funds for paths in said county, and have the right to lay out paths along any county road in said county and to act in conjunction with road supervisors in building and protecting said paths; that all paths heretofore built in this county are hereby declared bicycle paths and the funds collected in any precinct on request of any interested parties may be used in constructing paths in said precinct. That said supervisor may assess the sheriff in collecting the bicycle tax by naming deputies subject to consent of the sheriff, to collect said tax, provided the county of Clackamas shall in no way be responsible for any expense or cost incurred other than the safe keeping and lawful paying out of the said bicycle fund and not otherwise.
