

KILLING IN CROOK COUNTY.

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D. L. Bruner, of Molalia, Takes the Life of Thomas O'Reilly.

D. L. Bruner, who shot and killed Thomas O'Reilly April 4 near Ashwood in Black rock gulch, is a son of Frank Bruner, of Molalla. Stories of the killing differ greatly. Young Bruner says he shot the man in self defense, while the testimony before the coroners jury in Crook county would seem to indicate a cold blooded murder.

The facts are difficult to obtain, owing to the isolation of the tragedy. The Prineville Land and Live Stock com-Dany owns several bands of sheep. O'Reilly and D. L. Bruner were both employed as herders. Their bands of sheep were close together on the morning of April 4. The sheep were about to mix when an altercation ensued between the two mep. Another herder named John Creegan was 700 yards away. He says he saw O'Reilly approach Bruner with a rifle in his hands. Bruner pulled a revolver and shot O'Reilly through the elbow. O'Reilly then dropped his rifle and started to run. Bruner picked up the rifle and while O'Reilly was still running, shot him through the head.

As the testimony before the coroner's jury was given by Creegan, the only eye witness to the killing, it is said that it was rather one sided on account of Creegan and O'Rellly being close friends and partners in businees. Frank Bruner, of Molalla, will see that his son has proper legal counsel.
