

BLUDDING THE FISH LAW.

Fishing Companies to Bulldoze a Recently Enacted Law.

Although the last legislature passed a law prohibiting the use of fish wheels or any other net contrivance for catching fish, attempts are being made to bulldoze the statute. The law was passed because it looked foolish for the government to spend thousands of dollars...

It will be remembered that the state of Oregon spent some money building a fish ladder at Willamette Falls. Captain Leslie Pease and his compatriots looked on the fish ladder as a good place to set a wheel. In the face of the law Captain Pease erected a fish wheel at an entrance to the fish ladder. The boat was in working order last Sunday night. It was in charge of William Steiner, who is working for the Captain Pease company. At 5:30 o'clock Monday morning Henry Baltman, deputy warden, arrested Dutcher for violating the law. Dutcher had 99 salmon as a result of his night's work. Warden Baltman also took possession of the boat, for the law says he must confiscate it.

Last Tuesday afternoon Dutcher was resigned before Justice McAnulty and pleaded guilty. It was alleged in defense of Dutcher, that the law under which he was arrested was not constitutional because it did not include the Columbia river. This subterfuge belongs to the bluff that is being made. Dutcher was fined \$50 and costs, but the sentence was suspended pending an appeal to the circuit court.

In The Circuit Court.

In the Circuit Court this week the usual routine of business was transacted without anything of particular interest. F. Riley obtained a judgment against W. Youmans and May Youmans for \$30, the unpaid balance of a note for \$300 given by F. W. Youmans in 1895, and secured by a mortgage. An order was issued to foreclose the mortgage and allow \$50 for attorney's fees. The trial of Bert Jewell was postponed until November 5 next.
