WILSONVILLE TRAGEDY.

Edward McClincy Kills Howard Baker and Then Commits Suicide.

At 5 o'clock Wednesday afternoon at Boone's Ferry, Edward McClincy shot and instantly killed Howard Baker, with a Winchester rifle and afterwards committed suicide with the same rifle. Mr. McClincy left home for Ranier on last Tuesday to see his father but it was afterwards found that he never arrived at Ranier at all. He returned to his home at Boone's Ferry Wednesday about 2 o'clock in the afternoon wet and much excited claiming that the sheriff and a band of men were after him. He became more desperate later in the afternoon and suddenly took down the rifle stating he would kill the first man who attempted to take him. Mr. Baker who had always been friendly with McClincy and a brother in the same lodge undertook to enter upon the premises for the purpose of helping McClincy out of the delusion. McClincy saw him coming and said to his wife that he would shoot the first man who attempted to take him and stepped out on to the porch and fired the rifle at Mr. Baker, just entering the gate. Mr. Baker turned and took a few steps around the corner of the house and fell dead. McClincy then placed the rifle against his left breast and discharged it causing his death in 10 or 15 minutes.

Coroner Strickland and Sheriff Cook, went to the scene Thursday morning and investigated into the matter with a jury.

The jury found that Edward McClincy came to his death from a rifle shot discharged by himself into his breast while in a state of acute hereditary insanity, and that Howard Baker came to his death by a rifle shot discharged by Edward McClincy while the said Edward McClincy was in a state of acute hereditary insanity.

Both men were highly respected citizens and prosperous farmers, of their neighborhood, and the occurrence is horrifying to the citizens of the community where the men resided.

Mr. Baker leaves a wife and five children, and Mr. McClincy a wife and four children.

REPORT ON CANEMAH CROSSINGS.

J. P. Lovett Dissents From A. S. Dresser and W. S. U'Ren.

The commissioners heretofore appointed by Judge McBride consisting of A. S. Dresser, W. S. U'Ren and J. P. Lovett, to determine the points and manner in which the crossings should be made by the Oregon and Portland City Railway over the track of the O. & C. R. R. Co., filed their reports Wednesday. The commissioners unanimously reported that the most southerly crossing designated as No. 2 should be located as nearly as practicable between stations 845 and 846 of the O. & C. R. R. and shall be a crossing at grade constructed according to the best modern methods and plans to the satisfaction of the S. P. Co. and protected by an electric bell signal similar to those now in use by the O. & C. R. R. at many of its street crossings at Portland and Oregon City so as to give warning of the approach of any train or engine within a distance of 2500 feet from north or south of said crossing on the O. & C. R. R. tracks.

The most northerly crossing, A. S. Dresser and W. S. U'Ren determined should be an over-head crossing by the Portland City and Oregon Railway over the O. & C. R. R. track and should be constructed by the railway company and of a width of not less than 16 feet floor, the point of crossing to be as near as practicable between stations 826 and 827 on the O. & C. R. R. The railway track shall be placed on said crossing as nearly as practicable to the westerly side of said crossing and far enough to make it practical for teams and vehicles to pass the railway cars on said crossing. The north terminus of said crossing to be at or near station 818 on the O. & C. R. R. and the terminus of said crossing on the southerly side of the O. & C. R. R. track to be at a point on Main street in Canemah nearly opposite station 833 of the O. & C. R. R. Said crossing may be practically of the full width of the county road at the initial point at or near station 818, and shall be substantially planked and fenced so as to make the same safe for travel by teams and loaded vehicles.

Commissioner J. P. Lovett agreed in the main to the location of this crossing, but dissented from the determination of Commissioners Dresser and U'Ren, to make it an elevated crossing. Mr. Lovett determined that this crossing should also be a crossing at grade the same as the one further south, provided with gates and a guard to operate the gates night and day and protected by an elec-

The commissioners were unanimously of opinion that the most northerly crossing is very dangerous and that every practical appliance should be used at that point for the protection of the public and the fact that the railway is not necessarily a passenger carrier but as simply a freight road, does not materially lessen the danger at such crossing.

Commissioners Dresser and U'Ren determined that the overhead crossing will not be more expensive for maintenance and but little more expensive for construction than any crossing that will furnish any adequate protection to the traveling public, and that the overhead crossing will preserve a wagon road entrance from the south to Oregon City and that the result of a grade crossing would be a practical destruction of said wagon road.
